GREAT PREPARATION
FOR GRAND RALLYMany Republican Clubs Will Form in
Parade for Big Demonstration

The final arrangements for the grand Republican rally are about completed, and from present indications it will be the greatest political celebration ever held in the Willamette valley.

A number of bands have been engaged, and there will be an abundance of music, fireworks and street illuminations. It will be a fitting close of the campaign work of 1934.

The speakers will be met at the trains by bands and carriages during the afternoon and early evening, and escorted to the hotel.

The parade will form at the Willamette Hotel at 7:30, and, after a short time of march, which will be announced later, will go to the Grand Opera House, where there will be music by the quartets and speeches by Hon. John A. Mitchell, Hon. Wm. Kuykendall and Hon. Percy R. Kelly. State Committeeman Hal D. Patton will call the meeting to order, and State Chairman Frank C. Baker will be present.

The parade committee is working hard to secure an imposing and beautiful marching column. The University Republican Club will be in line 35 strong, with six-foot megaphones. The Militia Flambeau club will have 30 marchers. The Woolen Mills Republican Club will be out 40 strong with torches. The Chemawa Club will have 20 cymbals.

Then there will be the Salem Republican Club, the Roosevelt Club, the Young Men's Republican Club, the Roosevelt Club, The First Voters' Club, with torches, Roman candles and red fire sticks. The parade will be led by four Rough Riders and six Chemawa students. The entire line of march will be ablaze with red fire and pyrotechnical display.
