LIGHT WEIGHT FIGHTERS

Battle Tonight for the Championship of the World

San Francisco, Oct. 31.—Jimmy Britt, the great Californian, and Joe Gans, the lightweight champion of the world, cross arms in Mechanic's pavilion tonight for what is expected to be the greatest lightweight mill since Jack McAuliffe, once holder of the title, fought Jim Carney, the Englishman, and ran away from the ringside, still champion, but one of the worst beaten men that ever stepped within the roped enclosure.

The conditions of the battle, aside from the fact that it is a championship affair, make it one of the most unique in recent ring annals. The men will meet at the true lightweight limit, 133 pounds ringside. But aside from the interest that this most remarkable fact gives to the match, the records of the two men, their great ability as prize ring warriors and the money and title they will contend for, all make for one of the hardest fought battles between men of their weight in many a day.

Undenially "classy," strong, willing, masters of every trick of the game and possessed of remarkable powers of endurance, the boys are looked to put up a whirlwind affair that will go down into history, not as the best since McAuliffe's days, but the best ever pulled off.

There are, however, three reasons why fight fans should not be chagrined in case the battle has an unsatisfactory ending. One is that Gans may fail to make good his promise to be all that he needs to be at the weight, the lowest he has made since he beat Erne for the title. The second is that Gans' reputation for shaly work makes it not unlikely that he will turn another trick. The third is that he will prove to be so greatly superior to Britt that the meeting will be totally lacking in interest.

It is hardly probable, however, that either of these will come to pass. Gans condition to the low notch nicely and apparently is as strong as when he met Joe Walcott and gave the Barbadoes Terror the battle of his life.

While talk of a "job," as is customary in connection with San Francisco fights, has been in the air, it is extremely unlikely that Gans and his manager, Al Herford, would dare to pull off a cleanup here. If they should they would never be permitted to leave the city with whole skins. As for Britt, he is not in the cleanup business.

The third question, that of Gans' much vaunted superiority, is coming in for much serious consideration. The negro is a marvel. Britt is a grand little fighter, but hardly a marvel. He will have to beat or draw with the champion before he can claim that distinction.

The most important question, therefore, that obtrudes itself is whether or not Gans has made the weight and saved his strength. If he has the wise ones say he will win and cannot in any event lose, except by laying down or committing a palpable foul.

On the other hand, it is contended that Britt is younger, is as game, if not gamier, than the negro, can assimilate more punishment and hand out about as much. As to cleverness, he is outshone several degrees, and with Gans at his best, is not quite so strong.

With everything on the level and Gans not weak it must be a great go.

Britt has all the best of the articles in the matter of division of the purse. If he wins he gets 75 per cent, and if he loses or draws he gets 50 per cent. He refused to fight unless these concessions were made.

EATS POTATOES WORTH FORTUNE

This Man Dines Daily on Dish of Tubers Valued at \$2000.

London, Oct. 31.—When Lucullus, the epicure, felt particularly fastidious he (according to the Roman history books) would order from his chef a dish of peacocks' tongues garnished with the dust of precious stones. Throughout the intervening ages these classical examples of extravagance have remained unbent until yesterday afternoon, when a little Scotch gentleman who guarded a potato stall at the Crystal Palace established his claim to have surpassed all such records.

"I have more than once eaten £500 worth of potatoes for my dinner. They just tasted like good potatoes—white, mealy and fine flavored."

The man who thus eats fortunes is A. Findlay, who lives at Auchtermuchty, which is somewhere in Scotland. Son of a humble cottar, he until recently sold groceries and hardware at a country stall.

Now his name is known wherever a potato is grown; he has amassed a large fortune, and is the only man who consumes vegetables that are worth more than their weight in gold.

All this has come about through Mr. Findlay "breeding" classes of potatoes which every farmer in the world dreams of some day being rich enough to buy for seed purposes.

"See that specimen!" said Mr. Findlay pointing to a plate of potatoes in a glass case at the National Potato society's show at the Crystal Palace. "Well, a ton of those tubers is worth five million pounds sterling." Half a million pounds' worth of potatoes are actually exhibited at the Crystal Palace.
