PARKER DREAMS OF CARRYING YORK STATE

Democratic Candidate Will Make More Speeches Than He at First Intended

New York, Nov. 1.—Parker is gratified over the ovation received at Madison Square Garden last night. He is more confident than ever this morning that the national ticket will carry New York state. The candidate will leave at 5 o'clock this afternoon for Newark, N. J., where he will speak tonight. After the evening meeting he will

make a short speech at Jersey City, returning to New York on tomorrow morning. He denies himself to callers today, devoting his time to speech-building. Shortly after noon Parker went to consult a throat specialist regarding a slight hoarseness resulting from the open-air speaking. He will speak at Carnegie Hall and Cooper Union on Wednesday night.

RUSSIAN RIOTERS ON TRIAL

Gomel, Russia, Nov. 1.—The trial of persons charged with being responsible for anti-Jewish riots here in September, 1903, is in progress. There are 11 defendants, and 69 others are being held on the same case. The government is attempting to prove the disorders were in the nature of anti-Christian riots, and not of an anti-Jewish character. It is asserted that the riots were organized by the Jews to take vengeance for the Kishineff affairs.

Gans Wins on Foul.
San Francisco, Nov. 1.—Jimmy Britt tonight duplicated the stunt that he pulled off in Portland when he fought Jack O'Keefe by losing to Joe Gans in the fifth round on a foul. Britt, after he had the negro beaten to a frazzle, lost his head and not only once hit the Baltimore fighter while he was on one knee, but swung on him in the fourth and fifth rounds. When he hit Gans in the fourth round Referee Graney refused to acknowledge the claim of foul from Gans' corner, and waved both men to fighting. In the fifth round, which was about a minute old, Britt sent Gans to his knees by a series of body punches. Britt was fighting like a demon, and, not waiting for the negro to take the count, he swung on him several times, without waiting for Gans to get to his feet. Referee Graney grabbed Britt, waved him to his corner, and pointed the winning finger toward Gans.

In addition to the transaction of other business the meeting will choose delegates to represent Kentucky at the international convention of the order at Memphis next week.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Nov. 1.—Joe Wagner, of New York, and Patsy McKenna, of Boston, are to furnish the wind-up at tonight's boxing show of the National Sporting club of this city. The articles call for a ten-round contest at 115 pounds.

St. Louis, Nov. 1.—It is announced this morning that Knabenshue will make another ascension in Baldwin's airship at 2 o'clock this afternoon, if the weather conditions are good.

Shot While Hunting.

Engineers Strike.
Chicago, Nov. 1.—With both employers and employees confident of victory, a strike of 800 hoisting engineers in 240 bituminous coal mines in Illinois went into effect at 12 o'clock last night. The engineers refused to accept the 5 1/2 per cent reduction in wages which the miners have agreed to.

The strike affects about 50,000 workmen, but the operators are confident that many of their mines will be running within a few days.

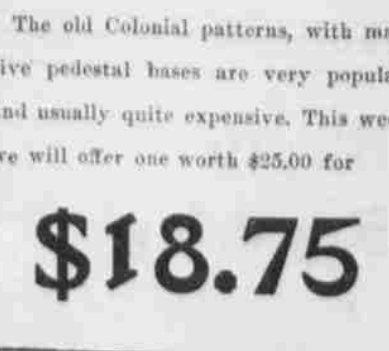
