DEMOCRATIC SAVINGS.

If Democracy has returned to "sanity," as Grover Cleveland asserts, it is certain the party has not yet purged itself of something even worse than insanity. Anarchists are a greater curse to any community than lunatics, for lunatics are often harmless to society, but anarchists, by their words and deeds, are always a menace. Take the case of Congressman J. T. Hefflin, for instance. He is an Alabamian with a mouth more dangerous than a dozen Czarinas. The assassin of President McKinley did not openly preach anarchism before carrying out his purpose and thereby incite others to slay public men. Hefflin is more cowardly. In a recent speech at Tuskegee, Ala., the home of Booker T. Washington, and the negro school conducted by him, Hefflin said:

"There they sat, Roosevelt and Booker, and if Czaros or one of his kind had thrown a bomb under the table no great harm would have been done to the country."

Of the report that Booker Washington was going to help to beat him for election to congress, Hefflin said:

"If Booker takes a hand in this thing it will be one time I will ask him to step out. I will ask him to 'hands off,' and you know we have a way of influencing negroes down here."

Hein, who succeeds Congressman Thompson, had a fight with his Republican opponent, Captain R. W. Walker, on Sunday. Smiling under this, he attacked Walker fiercely in his speech. He described him as "a black and tan serpent hissing at the feet of honest, upright Democrats." He said it was the desire of the Republicans to have Walker sent to congress so they could say: "Here's a friend of Booker Washington and it shows how he is looked upon down there and how the people uphold him."

"If Parker is elected President," he said, "and Booker Washington goes to Washington, you will find him eating in the kitchen instead of the dining-room."

Hefflin said he refused to meet Walker in joint debate because that would have recognized him as his equal. He added:

"I do not recognize any black and tan as my equal. I will not lower myself to the level of a black and tan who mingles on equal terms with negroes."

It avails Hefflin nothing to say his bomb talk was intended to be jocular. The fact remains that it was incendiary language, such as is made criminal by the anti-anarchist law recently passed by congress. The Democratic party has much to answer for, and unless it muzzles such blatant "nigger" haters as Hefflin it may have more crimes laid at its door. Hefflin is one of the leaders of the party in the South, and his utterances are an indication that Democracy is, at least, not "safe," even if it is now "gane," as Mr. Cleveland would have the people believe.

JUNGLE BOOK OF THE WEST.

The great uninhabited places of our country are championed by three authors, who have brought them into vivid reality to the large circle of readers who are looking for romance tipped with fact and adventure tinged with truth. Jack London, Stewart Edward White and Mary Austin during the last two years have undeniably created a literature as strong and virile and as resilient of the soil as did ever Kipling in his first and best work.

The first of these authors to seek the juvenile field is Mary Austin, who offers in "The Basket Woman" (Houghton, Mifflin & Co.) a collection of stories from the California desert, of Indians and coyotes, ranches and cattle miners and shepherds. Over them all there is a glamour of Mrs. Austin's rare power as a story teller, and the brilliant setting of the Sierra Nevada.

"The Basket Woman" might almost be called The Jungle Book of the West, not only on account of its subject, but on account of its style and spirit.

TIE YOUR HORSES.

The practice of leaving teams unhitched along the busy thoroughfares of the city is dangerous to life and property. Men who ordinarily are cautious, will drive in front of a store, and leave their horses without fastening them to a ring of post.

Street cars and automobiles are passing constantly, and even the most gentle animals will take fright when they are surprised. Women and children in crossing the streets, or even on the sidewalks, are endangered by such carelessness, and the city ordinance against this practice should be rigidly enforced.

Drivers would soon make proper provision for caring for their teams, and it is only just what they should. Ninety percent of the runaways that occur in a city come from this careless practice. Let the city official give due warning, and if that is not sufficient then a few examples might be made of the guilty parties.

AMERICAN FARMERS IN WESTERN CANADA.

Practically all of the American immigrants find their homes in the cities, villages and spacious farms of the west. As a considerable portion of the British immigration lodges in eastern Canada, the American invasion looms relatively larger in the west than it is compared with the whole human influx into Canada. Why do these Americans, the very cream of the farming population of the wealthy American west, seek homes in a foreign country? Briefly, the answer is to be found in the lure of free or cheap lands in western Canada and the inducement to turn the old farm into cash at high price. Farms in Iowa and Illinois are worth from seventy-five to one hundred and twenty-five dollars an acre. Farms in western Canada that in their virgin state will produce larger crops may be had for the taking or from five dollars to fifteen dollars an acre. To these lands turn also the American tenant farmer and the hired man. The free lands in the humid part of the republic's west are gone. Population has crowded up to the one hundred and first meridian, the general western limit of the humid belt. Beyond lies the cattle country and irrigation. The American farmer with a family of growing boys around him sees no way to keep the family together but to immigrate to the last free-land country on the continent, western Canada, "the last west." So he sells out, moves west, and settles his sons around him; together they may homestead and purchase several thousand acres. They will put this cheap land into wheat, plowing with traction engines that drive, simultaneously, nine furrows through the primeval sod. They may reasonably count on twenty bushels to the acre, which is less than the Manitoba average for more than twenty years. In years of high prices there is a fortune in a single crop. Good farmers sometimes get forty and fifty bushels of wheat to the acre. Think what such yields mean in these days of dollar wheat!—From "Western Canada in 1904," by Theodore Macfarlane Knappe, in the American Monthly Review of Reviews, for November.

Pass Worthless Notes.

If anyone offers you a piece of currency drawn on the Brunswick Bank, of New Jersey, you don't want it, unless you are a collector of curiosities and need it to complete your collection of worthless paper, says the Oregonian. After six months of inactivity, the passers of these worthless bills are victimizing the unknown. The bills are of either \$1 or \$10 currency and at first glance might pass for bona fide government currency. The Brunswick Bank is defunct, however, and the currency issued by it during the late war is just about as valuable as the Confederate currency.

Woodard & Clark have declined two of these notes this week, and in other places they have cropped out. The police have been notified.

However, to obtain a conviction is very difficult, as the money is not counterfeit, and does not come under the legal head of "worthless paper" in the Oregon statutes. The charge of vagrancy, however, can be applied by the police to those making a practice of passing the currency.

Seen to Like Grass.

A family consisting of a man, woman and a baby, all ragged and unkempt, who eat grass like cattle, and seem to enjoy it, was reported to the police at Everett, Wash. The report was made by a young girl, Anna Olson. She was accompanied by her younger brother. She claimed that both the latter and his older brother, Ray, saw the performance while they were herding cattle east of the city fair grounds. She stated that her brothers, on account of their discovery, feared to go near the police. The police promised to investigate.

According to the boys' story, they found both the man and woman munching grass with seeming relish. Whenever the baby cried they gave it a little to appease it. They also filled a pail with fodder to carry, as the boys supposed, to the children at home. The family fled when they discovered the boys' presence.
