

REGISTRATION BOOKS DISAPPEAR FROM FRESNO

Intense Excitement Caused Among Disfranchised Voters---Trouble Is Feared

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—Intense excitement was created in Fresno by the discovery that several books of registration affidavits were lost or stolen. Hundreds of registered Democrats are

deprived of their votes. Knots of wildly excited men are gathered on the street corners, and the county clerk's office is besieged by great crowds of disfranchised voters. Serious trouble is feared before night.

000 plurality. Parker is being scratched by the Bryan Democrats.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 8.—The weather is ideal and the vote heavy. It is claimed that the Republican candidate for governor will run behind the ticket.

Boston, Nov. 8.—The weather is clear and cool. Boston's vote will break the record.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 8.—Fifty thousand votes were cast up to noon, of which 35,000 are estimated to be Republican. The total vote may reach 100,000.

Kansas City, Nov. 8.—Roosevelt and Folk drew the heaviest vote during the forenoon, but there is nothing to warrant the Republican claim that Missouri is a doubtful state.

Indianapolis, Nov. 8.—Trouble is reported at over 100 polling places in the state this forenoon. It was caused by attempts at illegal voting, and many arrests were made.

Seattle, Nov. 8.—The heaviest vote in the history of the state is being cast over 60 per cent being out before noon. Both gubernatorial candidates,

Mead, Republican, and Turner, Democrat, claim they will win by from 10,000 to 15,000 plurality.

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—A particularly heavy vote is being cast in the city, where the voting machines are being given their first trial. As a rule the machines worked without a hitch, and gave rise to no dispute. A steady pace was kept up all morning to 11 o'clock, when the vote subsided to the noon hour, at which time the balloting began with renewed vigor. Reports from nearby counties indicate that the Republicans will elect all the congressmen, and practically all the assemblymen and senators.

Dover, Del., Nov. 30.—A heavy vote is being polled in Delaware today by both sides, and the weather is fine.

Concord, N. H., Nov. 8.—The weather is fair. There is much cutting of the ballots, but the state will go Republican, with reduced pluralities from those of 1902.

Cheyenne, Nov. 8.—Roosevelt's popularity is helping the Republican state and congressional tickets. The original estimates of the Republican majorities will probably be reached. Cheyenne is ahead in the race for the location of the state capitol.

Augusta, Me., Nov. 8.—Fair weather and a quiet election. The Republican plurality will be about \$25,000.

Kingston N. Y., Nov. 8.—Parker arrived at his polling place in the third district of the ninth ward at 10:40

o'clock. A hundred men gathered in front of the building to get a look at the candidate. He voted his ballot at 1:47, taking 30 seconds in the booth. Half a dozen cameras clicked as he handed his ballot to the clerk. He remained at Kingston several hours before returning home.

New York, Nov. 8.—President Roosevelt reached Jersey City at 12:30 o'clock, and left for Washington at 1:14. He is in high spirits, and confident of success.

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—The Democrats concede the city of San Francisco to the Democrats by a plurality of 8000.

Indianapolis, Nov. 8.—Senator Fairbanks voted shortly before 2 o'clock. After talking with his neighbors about the polls for a few minutes, he returned to his residence. Tonight the senator will receive the returns at the Columbia Republican club, where he will be a guest of honor.

Elkin, W. Va., Nov. 8.—Ex-Senator Davis breakfasted at 8 o'clock, and then journeyed to the polling place, a mile away on foot. While en route he was given an ovation by the citizens. He voted shortly before 9 o'clock. From the short time he was in the booth, he evidently voted a straight ticket.

New Castle, Ind., Nov. 8.—The plant of the Chicago Steel Company, in this city, was burned today. The loss is \$100,000.

Lime Caught Fire.

South Bend Wash. Nov. 8.—The three-masted schooner lies on the bottom of Willapa river opposite South Bend in 14 feet of water where she was sunk yesterday morning in order to extinguish a lime fire in her hold. The fire had been burning four days and this was the only port the captain could make because of heavy weather. She was loaded with 3800 barrels of Roche Harbor lime and 150,000 feet of lumber.

Pendleton, Nov. 8.—It is now believed that Frank Wells, the Camas Prairie stockman, who has been missing nearly five weeks, left the country with the intention of remaining away.

Officers working on the case have reason to believe that Wells has not met with foul play, as was at first supposed. Today three suits of attachment were filed against Wells' personal property for the total amount of \$770. Wells owed nearly \$1500 in addition to various persons in the county.
