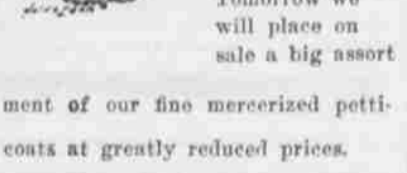

The Fall of Babylon.

The most magnificent of the ancient cities was mighty Babylon. Situated on both sides of the great Euphrates river, it was surrounded by a wall so wide that even at the top, where it was 100 feet high two war chariots, each drawn by four horses, could easily pass.

To please the queen, who was a native of the mountainous country great mounds or hills, were built up within the city, and these were called the "hanging gardens" so famous in history.

The queen at this time was Nitocris, mother of Belshazzar, and to her much of the magnificence and beauty of the city is accredited. The walls of the city were so strong and high that it was not thought by the Babylonians that an enemy could penetrate to the heart of the city, but Cyrus, king of Persia, was one who would not desist in any undertaking until it was accomplished. He besieged the Babylonians many months, but their stronghold was not to be taken by his attacks, and in time he began to search for other means to enter the city. Taking as an example, the manner in which Ninevah had been conquered, he began to dig great trenches, into which the waters of the Euphrates river might be turned, and, selecting the time of a great feast given by Belshazzar to his officers and courtiers, when they were stupefied with wine and carousals, Cyrus ordered the waters to be turned from their natural channel, and, as the great flood poured into the ditches dug for that purpose, the soldiers crowded along the comparatively dry bed of the river and, passing under the great walls, were in the very heart of the city before the drunken revelers were aware of their presence. To put the surprised soldiers to the sword was an easy task for the victorious besiegers, and, in spite of a gallant resistance, Belshazzar was slain as he attempted to escape from the banquet hall. Thus ended the career of the greatest of the ancient kings, who, although young in years, has become one of the best known characters in the history of those times. The entire story is full of tragic situations, and one that lends itself to portrayal in music better than any other of the old Bible stories, and the presentation as it will be given in the Grand Opera House next Tuesday and Wednesday nights will surpass in scenic effect any opera before produced by the home people.
