ALBANY WILL SEND DELEGATION OF ROOTERS

The football team of the Oregon Agricultural College will play the Albany College team at Albany on Saturday, December 3d, and final arrangements are pending for the game. The O. A. C. steadfastly refused to meet the Albany team before the game with the U. of O., and if they had won from the latter team it is safe to say that they would stand on their former grounds.

Defeat or victory is only an empty honor for them now, outside of college pride, and they can well afford to play the game, as it will be a good money-maker.

Willamette is entitled to a game with Corvallis, and the local management should demand it. The team is stronger than it has ever been, and has a right to college games. O. A. C. is ever ready to meet the teams from Washington, Idaho, Utah and other states, but is slow to accept offers from the Oregon colleges, unless they are weaker aggregations.

Albany rooters will probably run an excursion train from that city, the train to leave that place about 12:30 p. m. and leave Salem on the return at 6 o'clock. The train will carry, it is said, about 200 enthusiastic supporters of the team, and they will come down prepared to see victory perched upon their banners at the close of the game.

Willamette will practice hard for the last time today, and the next two days will be devoted to light signal plays and formations. The men have the utmost confidence in the outcome of the game, and do not hesitate to say that they do not fear the result.

Albany has engaged the services of Coach McGhee, of the Forest Grove team, and he will round out the plays, and put the men through a course of "sprouts" for the Willamette and Corvallis games. It is also said that Dick Smith, of the U. of O., will help the up-valley collegians for the O. A. C. contest.

WEEKLY NEWS BUDGET FROM THE CAPITAL

The day after the election the leading business men of Washington thronged the white house to congratulate its occupant, and each of them brought a rose until Mr. Roosevelt found his arms full. Just a four years ago great bunches of carnations were given to President McKinley.

Among the callers on Wednesday was the aged widow of General Anderson, of Fort Sumpter fame, with a big bunch of flowers in her hands. The president hastened to her carriage to save her the trouble of alighting. The contrast between the two was worthy of note. Mr. Roosevelt could hardly have been more than two years of age when the husband of this woman was heroically defending the fort under his command. When your correspondent first made the acquaintance of Mrs. General Anderson she was a guest at Cranston's famous New York hotel, which has long since disappeared from Broadway in the great city. Then she was handsome vivacious and in the full vigor of middle life, with dark hair and eyes. Now she is gray, wan and feeble. These little home incidents show in what estimation the president is held by his neighbors.

FAILURE OF RUSSIA TO GOVERN POLAND

London, Nov. 22.—The failure of Russia's efforts to mobilize the army reserve men in Poland is explained and made clear in correspondence just received from St. Petersburg. It seems that the trouble first arose at Bieladny, near Warsaw, where sanguinary encounter was provoked by the brutality of an officer. A major was drilling a newly-arrived company of reservists, and becoming enraged at their awkwardness abused and assaulted several of them. At last he turned on one man, whom he had specially singled out for ill-treatment, and dealt him a stinging blow across the face with his riding whip. The man replied with a blow that sent the officer staggering. Another officer went to this assistance with drawn sword, but the temper of

the men was now thoroughly aroused, and both men were felled to the ground and savagely belabored with the butt ends of the soldiers' rifles. Two companies of the active army came up at the double and charged the reservists with fixed bayonets. A savage encounter followed. The reservists were finally overpowered, but not before a score of the regulars were stretched lifeless in the barrack square and fifty others wounded. Fully half the reservists were killed, together with the two officers over whom the trouble arose. The surviving reservists were led out, the next morning and summarily shot.

Following this affray there were similar riots at many points throughout Russian Poland and the situation finally became such that the authorities

were totally unable to deal with it. In all the cities and towns men marched through the streets singing Polish songs and voicing their opposition to the mobilizing of the reserves. The situation became so acute that the imperial authorities, as announced in a St. Petersburg dispatch of last week, to abandon all further attempts to mobilize the army reserve men in Poland and to send them to their homes.
