CITY ELECTION FAILS TO CREATE INTEREST

With the city election scarcely more than a week distant, the usual excitement is absent, and the workers are smarting under the enforced idleness. Never before in the history of the city has an election been preceded with such a feeling of antipathy on the part of the voters.

This is not due to oversight, as it is evident that the voters are watching events, from the large vote polled on the day of the Republican primary election.

This is due in the most part to the general satisfaction with existing affairs, and a desire on the part of the taxpayers to let well enough alone. At the present time the only opposition candidate to the Regular Republican ticket named at the direct primary is on the official of marshal, and it is not likely that the contest will extend to any other office. Election occurs on Monday, December 5th, and very little time is left to make a campaign by the opponents of the present administration.

The polling places will be as follows:

First Ward—At E. P. Walker's barn, Union street, between High and Church.

Second Ward—At the Police Court room in the City Hall.

Third Ward—At Simpson's livery stable, High street, between Court and State streets.

Fourth Ward—At Lowe's livery stable, corner High and Ferry streets.

Fifth Ward—At Fennell's wagon shop, on Liberty street, North Salem.

Sixth Ward—At the street car barn, Twenty-first and State streets.

Seventh Ward—At Jory's fruit dryer.

The boundaries of the voting precincts are identical with the ordained boundaries of the seven wards of the city.

BOTTLE AROUSES INTEREST

Fuller & Douglas, the State street grocers, have a curiosity in the shape of a bottle of table delicacies, at least that is what it is supposed to be.

In a large shipment of fancy dishes, which recently arrived from New York, a small black bottle, labeled "France," was found. CHERRY CROP IN COURT

R. W. Carey, of Macleay, has filed a complaint against H. S. Gile & Co. for \$112.88, for the price of some cherries, in department No. 1 of the circuit court. The complaint states that on June 13, 1904, plaintiff entered into an agreement for the purchase of defendant's crop of cherries, to be raised on defendant's farm near Macleay, consisting of Royal Ann, Black Republican and other varieties. The price to be paid was 4 cents per pound for Royal Anns, 3 cents for other white varieties, and 2½ for Black Republicans, f. o. b. cars at Macleay, the cherries to be of good merchantable quality, free from leaves or defective fruit, and carefully packed with stems, so far as possible. It also states that between June 13th and July 25th plaintiff delivered and R. W. Craig received, as agent for defendant at Macleay, 4521 pounds of Royal Anns and 6102 pounds of Black Republicans, and that as first cause for complaint defendant only paid \$120.50 for Royal Anns worth \$180.84; second cause for complaint paid \$89.75 for Black Republicans worth \$132.88. Wherefore plaintiff prays for a decree for \$50.08 on first cause and \$62.80 on second cause, with interest at 6 per cent, and the costs and disbursements of the action.
