

SPORTING FRATERNITY WATCH FIGHTERS

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—The sport element of the Pacific Coast is intensely excited over the fight tonight between "Young Corbett" and "Bat Nelson" before the Hayes Valley athletic club. There have been many pugilistic encounters held in the Golden Gate City during the last ten years, but few have aroused more public interest than the battle to be pulled off tonight. It is the sole topic of conversation on the streets, in restaurants, clubs and homes, and for the moment everything else of a public nature seems to have been forgotten. While both fighters have a host of well-wishers, it is a different thing when it comes to betting money. Corbett is a 10-to-7 favorite. There are many men who believe that Nelson has a chance to win this battle, and they are taking considerable of the money offered at 10 to 7. It is true that Corbett is reported to be in as good condition as he ever was for a fight, but some sporting men have grave doubts of his ability to go a route on this occasion with such a fast fighter as the one who conquered Eddie Hanlon. On the other hand, warm friends of Corbett just smile at this, and simply say they have the money to back their man. They are the most confident of the confident; if Corbett feels as they do, he is likely to enter the ring with a trifle too much regard for his own ability.

Whoever is returned the winner the prospects are for one of the best fights ever seen on the Coast. There are no better matched pugilists in the ring today in point of build and strength. In fact, they are almost alike as regards style and execution. Both use a sort of a crouch and are possessed of great aggressiveness which calls for constant action in the ring. There is not much to choose between them in punching power. They can knock a man out with either hand, and when it comes to guinness it is a toss-up who is the quicker.

Nelson is practically a newcomer, but for the time he has been in the business he has done enough to warrant more than passing consideration. Since Nelson began to show his real form he has put away two dangerous rivals, Eddie Hanlon and Martin Canole. The former fought Corbett a 20-round draw and Canole also met Jimmy Britt a like number of rounds.

In facing Corbett, Nelson will have

to be at his best. Corbett is a fighter to the backbone, and does not mind a punch or two as long as he can get one home himself. He has had more ring experience than Nelson and this may count him in good stead when they come together tonight. Corbett has demonstrated his ability to take all kinds of punishment and Nelson will have to get in his best blow to win the decision.

From their respective training quarters reports come today that both fighters are fit as the proverbial fiddle and eager for the fray. Since the match was made both men have been training faithfully and whoever is the loser, he will not be able to fall back on the old excuse of being in poor condition. Corbett's trainers report that never before in his ring career has he paid more attention to getting into condition than he has done for his match with Nelson. Nelson has had the benefit of being under the guidance of old-timers who know every point of the fighting game and from all accounts he will enter the ring in the pink of condition. The two will weigh in at 130 pounds at 6 o'clock tonight. Neither one has experienced any difficulty in making the stipulated weight.

The following figures show how evenly the two fighters are matched:

Neck—Corbett 15½ inches; Nelson 15 inches.

Shoulders—Corbett 41 inches; Nelson 41½ inches.

Chest—Corbett 37 inches; Nelson 37 inches.

Reach—Corbett 66½ inches; Nelson 66½ inches.

Massachusetts at the Centennial.

Portland, Nov. 28.—With the liberal appropriation of \$15,000 to spend and the handsome building, already constructed, Massachusetts' participation at the Lewis and Clark exposition will be worthy of that commonwealth.

Although the state will make an extensive display in almost every department, features will be made of the educational and manufacturing exhibits.

The Massachusetts building, erected at the Louisiana Purchase exposition will be taken apart and re-erected at Portland. The structure is an imposing edifice of the Colonial type of architecture. It is two stories high and a mansard. The main entrance is through a high ornate portico supported by large columns. Large porches at each end add greatly to the attractiveness of the building.

The central room on the first floor presents an exact reproduction of the senate chamber in the old state house at Boston. The side rooms, used as ladies' and gentlemen's reception, writing and lounging rooms, are in proportions the same as similar rooms in the historic old building. On the upper floor is the "historic room." This is a reproduction of the new senate chamber in the state house. Here will be displayed in glass cases many priceless relics of our forebears. Among them will be a massive pair of earrings, buried during the revolution to keep them out of the hands of the British, a piece of embroidery done by Rose Standish while coming over in the Mayflower, and a pipe which Miles Standish smoked in 1620. There will also be displayed many other relics of the revolutionary days and of those who fought at Bunker Hill.

Centennial Notes.

A comprehensive Philippine display will be an interesting feature of the Lewis and Clark centennial.

One of the logs used in the construction of the forestry building at the Lewis and Clark exposition weighed 27 tons.

An interesting collection of old mining implements will form a part of Oregon's exhibit at the Lewis and Clark centennial.

The annual convention of the National Association of Railroad Commissioners, which will meet in Deadwood, S. D., next August, will adjourn to Portland and hold its concluding sessions at the Lewis and Clark centennial.
