INVENTED WALNUT CLEANER

Passengers on the depot car for the last two or three days have been mystified by the sight of a barrel bored full of holes revolving on an axle in the middle of the south fork of Mill Creek, where the car track crosses the stream. On investigation it was learned that the contrivance was the property of Harry Munson, who works with his father at the wagon shop near that point. The barrel is studded with nails on the inside, and is used for cleaning black walnuts. The green nuts are put into the machine through a trap in the barrel, and left for about two hours. When they are removed at the end of that time the pods are scraped from the nuts, and the water, which is admitted through the holes, has washed them quite clean, and all that is necessary to prepare them for eating is drying. About a bushel of nuts are cleaned at one time, and without any trouble, other than placing them in and removing them from the cleaner. Mr. Munson has from six to seven bushels cleaned daily, and cleaned more thoroughly than if done by hand. Munson has cleaned his entire stock of nuts already, and now has the machine to let to other young men of the neighborhood, they paying him a share of the proceeds for the use of the plant.

Pioneers at Salem.

John Hoefler, of Champoeg, was in town yesterday, and met many old friends. Among them was P. S. Knight, who was at Champoeg as a young man, in the employ of the Hudson Bay Company. Mr. Hoefler is remarkably well preserved for his age, and shows that he is descended from the tough mountain stock of his Tyrolean ancestors. We are glad to learn that his partner, Caspar Zorn, who was reported dead and buried, is alive and well, and enjoying himself, riding about on his pony and looking after his business. Their many friends at Salem wish them many years of life. Hoefler & Zorn have for many years been the third largest taxpayers in the county, and are the largest taxpayers who are merely land owners in Marion county.

Among the pioneers in the city the past week was Wm. Alberson, son of Solomon Alberson, who settled at Sublimity in 1850. Mr. Alberson, Jr., who is a man in the prime of life, now resides in Harney county at the city of Burns. He was married at Sublimity by Hon. Geo. S. Downing, justice of the peace, and Mr. and Mrs. Alberson live to attest that if it was Judge Downing's first job of that kind the knot was well tied. Mrs. Alberson is a sister of Mrs. Sam Jones, and has been making a visit at Brooks, where her sister resides. Mrs. Alberson left Marion county 34 years ago, and this is his first visit here since his departure. To say that he was royally entertained by his old friend, Downing, is only stating what takes place whenever Uncle George meets up with one of the friends of his younger days, no matter where he hails from.

CHINESE CEREMONY AT FIRST

Chew Hop, the pretty Chinese bride of Yow Jeong Hing, arrived from her San Francisco home on the morning overland, and was immediately escorted to the future family home, where, after she had removed the stains of travel, and rested sufficiently, the wedding ceremony was solemnized by the bridegroom's father, Quong Hing. The Journal was partly in error last night when it stated that the happy couple would have a Christian marriage today. The ceremony was performed under the Chinese rites, but this will be strengthened by an American ceremony sometime in the near future. After the marriage Quong Hing, in his new capacity as father-in-law, presided at a banquet, given in honor of the new couple, but at which they were not present. This evening, about 4 o'clock, another feast will be held which will be much more elaborate than the function of the morning, all residents of Chinatown being present, and the meal being enlivened by the discharge of firecrackers and bombs. The newly married couple will preside at this banquet, but it has not been learned whether rice will be thrown or eaten. One strange fact in connection with the marriage is that the bride and groom never saw each other until this morning, the match being made by the parents of the groom, who picked out little Chew Hop as a suitable helpmate for their dutiful son.

Neilon, ex-sheriff of Lake county, who was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary in the spring of 1903, for the embezzlement of county funds, was today pardoned by Governor Chamberlain, on a petition from the citizens and taxpayers of that county.
