CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION

Jas. L. Skipton Files Notice of Contest on Office of City Marshal

City Council met in regular session last night with ten aldermen in attendance. Aldermen Jacobs, Sims, Smith and Walker being absent.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The committee on streets reported that the two fir trees ordered cut down last week have been removed.

Committee on licenses reported favorably on the application of Neusbaum Bros., J. A. Cooper and A. Schrieber for liquor licenses, which were ordered granted.

The committee on lights reported the need of a light on the east end of the Polk county bridge, which was ordered.

The committee on fire and water reported favorably on the proposed office of the ice company, to be built back of the C. L. & T. Co's office, and the report was adopted.

City Recorder Judah submitted his report for November:

The total receipts for the month were \$1,086.27; cash on hand November 1st, \$1,360.90; total, \$2,447.26. By cash to treasurer, \$1,360.99; cash on hand December 1st, \$1,086.27. Warrants issued November, \$3,234.30.

Mayor Waters and Recorder Judah submitted a report of the official canvass of the city election returns which correspond with the report printed in the Journal yesterday.

The recorder reported that Alex Corroyer filed an application for a liquor

license, which was granted.

A petition for a footbridge across the ditch on the south side of Leslie street between 12th and 14th street was referred to the committee on streets.

A petition to put a corrugated iron roof on the old summer theatre on Commercial street, to use same for a feed shed was referred to the committee on fire and water.

A petition for a light on the corner of 12th and State streets was referred to the committee on lights.

Fire Chief Pugh reported that the harness of the department has been in use for 13 years, and recommended the purchase of new harness. He also reported the resignation of the driver of the hose wagon, Lee Collard, and recommended E. D. DeLong to fill the place and the resignation of Hoseman Loose, and recommended the appointment of Fred Kurtz. Referred to the committee on fire and water, with power to act.

Petition for crosswalks at Center and 31st streets referred to the committee on streets.

The report of C. B. Lockwood, the bridge expert, who examined the steel bridge was read and referred to the committee on bridges.

James Skipton petitioned the council that he was qualified to hold the office of marshal and that Thos. Cornelius was not qualified to hold the office, and asked the council to issue him a certificate of election. L. K. Adams, as Skipton's attorney addressed the council, and on motion the matter was referred to a committee of three to investigate.

The usual resolution was adopted, ordering that certificates of election be issued to the successful candidates for city offices, with the exception of Thos. E. Cornelius, as marshal, and that his case be made a special order of business for next Thursday evening.

On motion the recorder was ordered to notify Cornelius, and likewise Skipton, of the contest, and of the time set for the hearing.

A resolution was adopted ordering the city treasurer to pay all moneys in the special funds into the general fund where it is shown that the general contributed to the making of the special fund.

A resolution was also adopted that the council, when it adjourned, would adjourn until 7:30 next Thursday evening.

Kays & Kays, saloon men, reported that they had sold their business, and the action of the recorder, in transferring the license ratified.

of Salem, both real and personal, as shown by the 1904 assessment roll, prepared by County Clerk Roland, was reported to amount to \$2,820,622.

A request from the Yew Park Hose Company for three ladders, one 16-foot extension, and two roof ladders was heard and the committee on fire and water was ordered to buy same, not to exceed \$15 in purchase price.

On motion the street commissioner was ordered to remove or cause to be removed the stockyards belonging to Mr. Densmore, which are situated on Leslie street, between 12th and 13th.

Recorder Judah notified the council of the filing of complaint against the city by Celeste M. Liston for \$100 damages for personal injury sustained by a defective crosswalk Alderman Gesner moved to retain Attorney Bingham in this case, as he is familiar with the facts. The recorder also notified them of the filing of a complaint by Charles Livenley against G. P. Litchfield and David Steiner as judges of election in ward No. 2 for refusing his ballot on the ground that he had not paid his road poll tax for the year of 1904. He claims to be damaged in the amount of \$1000. Alderman Gesner moved to secure an attorney for the defense of the defendants at the expense of the city.
