

# COUNCIL DECLARED CORNELIUS ELECTED

## Every Alderman Present Except Bayne Voted for the Republican Candidate

The city council met in adjourned session last night, with all the aldermen present except Catlin, Jacobs and Judah.

Recorder Judah reported that war- rants for the following claims for labor and election expenses were issued, and his action was ratified by council. The street labor claims are as follows:

with this council on the evening of December 5, 1904, praying this council to refrain from declaring said Cornelius so elected to said office, and to withhold from said Cornelius a certificate of such election, that it is the sense of this council that the charter of this city does not confer upon this body the proper authority, nor any authority, to intervene nor render judgment in the matter of protest or contest as between the parties named for the office indicated, but, in view of the official returns from the election aforesaid, delivered to this council by the mayor and recorder, and adopted by this council, the council must, and does hereby, as its only authorized act in the premises, declare that T. E. Cornelius is duly elected to the office of marshal of this city, and that the recorder be, and he is hereby directed to issue a certificate of election as aforesaid to the said Cornelius in due course.

Attorney P. H. D'Arcy appeared for the contestant, and entered a protest against the adoption of the resolution. Alderman Bayne raised a point of order on the grounds that the matter was still pending, according to the resolution adopted at the last meeting.

The proceedings of the last meeting were then read and the point was overruled by Mayor Waters. A vote was then taken and carried, every alderman voting yes, with the exception of Bayne, who voted no.

On motion, the council resolved itself into a committee of the whole to consider the budget for the ensuing year, and Alderman Gesner was called to the chair.

The total amount of taxable property in the city was reported at \$2,820,622 and the necessary tax levy for city purposes 10 mills, road tax 1 1/2 mills and road poll \$3 per capita. A tax of 1/2 mill for park purposes was proposed, but, after discussion, was defeated, and an appropriation of \$500 was made for the parks.
