ROBERT BURNS' BIBLE

London, Dec. 10.—At Sotheby's rooms today the family Bible of Robert Burns, published by John Reid at Edinburgh in 1766, was put up for sale at auction. It contains in the poet's own handwriting the following entries respecting himself, Jean Armour (his wife), and his children:

"Robert Burns was born at Alloway in the parish of Ayr, January 25, 1759. Jean Armour, his wife, was born at Manchinle February 27, 1767. September 3, 1786, were born to them twins, Robert, their eldest son, at a quarter past noon, and Jean, since dead at 14 months old. March 3, 1788, were born to them twins again, two daughters, who died within a few days after their birth. August 18, 1789, was born to them Francis Wallace, so named after Mrs. Dunlop of Dunlop. He was born at a quarter before seven, forenoon. April 9, 1791, between three and four in the morning, was born to them William Nicol, so named after William Nicol, of the high school, Edinburgh. November 21, 1792, at a quarter past noon, was born to them Elizabeth Riddel, so named after Mrs. Robert Riddel of Glenriddel."
