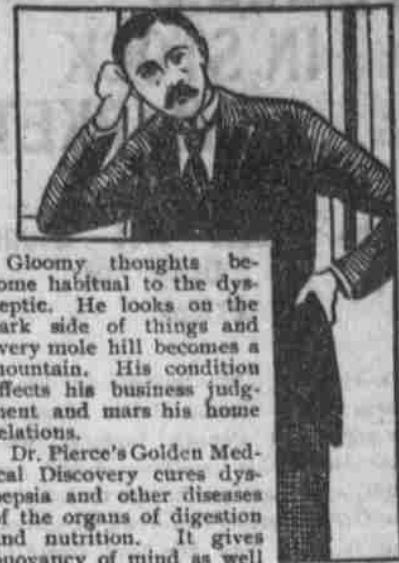

LARGE HATCH OF SALMON

Superintendent Frank Smith, of the Coos river hatchery, reports that he has taken this year 10,306,000 salmon eggs, and the whole hatchery, all the wash basins, tubs and pans around the place, besides an extra chamber set, are overflowing with the embryonic chinooks, which are just beginning to hatch, says the Marshfield Mail.

Many of the eggs have been simply fertilized and planted in the gravel, as that was the best that could be done. Millions more could have been taken if there had been any way to take care of them. As it is, nearly 4,000,000 more eggs have been handled than last year.

A new move is the establishment of what is called an eyeing station on the north fork of the Coquille, over the hill from the hatchery. The eggs will be taken over there from the hatchery a week or ten days before they hatch, and will be turned loose where they belong, in the headwaters of the river.

The work being done by this institution under its present management is a most important one, and will do much to prevent the extinction of the salmon industry in these waters.

Peculiar Accident.

Yesterday evening while Gilbert Pickard was pouring rabbit metal into a casting at Frazier's foundry, the metal exploded, striking him in the face, forming a complete cast over both eyes, that could not be removed until Dr. Day arrived and cut the eyebrows and eyewinkers loose. The metal formed a complete covering inside under the lids.

Pickard suffered intense pain until the metal was removed. One eye is all right, but the other is considerably damaged, and he may lose the sight.—Eugene Register.

Eastern Oregon Wheat. County Commissioner Horace Walker has just returned from a trip through Gilliam county, and finds wheat in the same condition as in Umatilla county—badly in need of rain, and that at once, if it is to be saved, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

The outlook for wheat is decidedly precarious at this time, all over the Inland-Empire wheat belt. Two or three light freezes will take all the remaining moisture out of the ground and kill almost every crop in the country.

Mr. Walker is impressed with the permanent manner in which the Condon-Arlington branch of the O. R. & N. is being built. All the deep canyons are being filled in substantially, instead of being bridged over with temporary piling bridges, and the grade is to be made in the most solid and permanent manner. A large force of men is at work on the grade and it is hoped to complete it early in the spring.
