School Questions.

Editor Journal: If the following questions are answered some people will be wiser by the answer. I myself would know more, and in consequence many others. Please do not refer me to some almost inaccessible source of information:

How many school children are there in Oregon between the ages of 4 and 20 years?

How many names of students enrolled in all of the normal schools of the state of Oregon?

How much money per capita to the children of the state?

How much per capita is appropriated for those enrolled in the normal schools?

Who are custodians of the school funds of the state?

Whose business is it to manage those funds?

You may know the answers to these questions. If so, the knowledge will be easily imparted. Please help us. J. K. BUFFE.

(There are 148,720 school children in the state between the ages of 4 and 20 years.)

The normal schools are divided into departments, and during the present year there were in the normal department 549 students, and in the training department 599, making a total of 1148 students enrolled in the four normal schools of the state.

The school tax per capita for the year 1904 was \$1.61.

The sums appropriated for the normal schools annually by the legislature are as follows: Ashland \$9318, Weston \$8000, Drain \$6600, Monmouth \$12,500.

The custodians of the school funds are the state land board, which has charge of the real property, and the secretary of state, who has the money.

The funds are not all in one general fund, and the management of these are left to the county and state officials.—Ed. Journal.)
