Stanley's Memorial.

London, Dec. 30.—In Pirbright
churchyard a memorial of a remark-
able kind has just been placed over
the grave of the late Sir Henry M.
Stanley, the African explorer, whose
widow was desirous of securing for
the purpose some great monolith,
'fashioned by the ages, tempered and
colored by time and untouched by
man.' Search was made, especially
in the neighborhood of Dartmoor, and
eventually a large granite monolith
was discovered that appeared to be
suitable. It was in a recumbent po-
sition, forming part of a fence on the
roadside, and three of its faces were
known to have been exposed for many
years.

This stone, which is 12 feet long,
four feet wide, two feet six inches
thick, and weighs six tons, was con-
veyed from Devonshire to Pirbright
with much difficulty, and it now stands
with the simple inscription, "Henry
Morton Stanley," also the name by
which he was known on the Dark Con-
tinent, "Bula Matari" (the rock
breaker), the word "Africa," and
above all a cross.

Trial of the Chattanooga.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.—The
new protected cruiser Chattanooga,
which was partially constructed by a
private shipbuilding concern, but com-
pleted by the United States govern-
ment at New York, is to have her offi-
cial speed trial today over the Cape
Ann-Cape Porpoise course. The con-
tract calls for 16 knots an hour. As
she has already made 17.3 knots in a
preliminary trial, no fear is felt in

Angora Goats

The Commercial club has received a
letter from a gentleman in Nevada
who wishes to engage in the Angora
goat business in the Willamette val-
ley. The letter is printed below, and
we hope all our readers who can give
facts will send in written statements
that can be used by the Commercial
club to induce such men as this one
from Nevada to come to Oregon, and
make him feel that we are all work-
ing to locate just such citizens in our
country.

Delamar, Nev., Dec. 24, 1904.

Gentlemen: I understand there
are quite a few people in the Angora
goat business in your locality. I
wish to embark in the same, and be-
ing ignorant of the industry I thought
I couldn't do a better thing than lo-
cate near people who have had con-
siderable experience in that line.
Now you will have some idea of the
kind of information I want.

I wish to combine the raising of
goats with the clearing of brush land.
That is, after the land is cleared of
brush, it would be good and suitable
for general farming. Now, can you
give me these details:

1. The address of one or two reliable breeders.
2. The outlook regarding market for mohair and carcasses.
3. How near to town and school can I homestead?
4. Where can I get literature and map describing the place?
5. Can you give me price for good Angoras?

Information the Club Wants.

can be secured. Send by mail to the
Greater Salem Commercial club, Sa-

of Angoras if you have any for sale.

to give information direct to the man
from Nevada and others who are in-

ling goats will give the club accurate
information on that subject a printed
statement will be issued and circulated
by the thousand through the corre-
