Toole Sworn in Again.

Helena, Mont., Jan. 2.—Joseph K. Toole was today inaugurated as governor of Montana for this third time. The other state officers-elect also took the oath of office.

Inauguration of Higgins.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 2.—Frank W. Higgins was inaugurated as governor of New York today. The ceremony was witnessed by a great crowd of people gathered in the assembly hall of the capitol. Preceding the ceremony there was a large military parade that included the Second regiment, Tenth battalion, and Cavalry Troop B of this city, the Forty-third Separate company of Olean, and a detachment from the Second battery of New York city. For the first time at an inauguration in this state there was

an artillery salute of 19 guns in honor of the incoming governor. This was fired by the gunners of the New York battery exactly at noon.

Bishop Doane, of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Albany, offered prayer, and Secretary of State O'Brien administered the oath of office to the governor-elect, after which Governor Odell welcomed his successor.

At the public reception at the executive mansion in the afternoon fully 5000 people grasped Governor Higgins' hand, and many more were unable to gain admittance.

Passing of Judge Clancy.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 2.—The turning out of the old and the incoming of the new state officials in Montana today marked the passing of a character of national fame—Judge William Clancy, whose term of office as judge of the Second judicial district has expired. There probably never has been a district judge in America who earned such an extended reputation as Judge Clancy. His eccentricity, brusqueness, homely wit and native Missouri humor all served to spread the glory of his fame broadcast. During his term on the bench he tried and decided some of the most important mining suits ever tried in America. The three leading cases were the famous Pennsylvania case, the Nipper, and the second trial of the Minnie Healey, all in the litigation between Augustus Heinze and the Amalgamated. His decisions were uniformly in favor of Heinze, and because of that fact the judge became an object of severe criticism. He says he has had enough of public life, and will resume his law practice in this city.
