WORLD FAIR NOTES

Nebraska will have a big display at the Lewis and Clark exposition.

A Cairo street, and Asiatic village, and an exhibit showing the life and customs of the Japanese and Chinese will be features of the "Trail" at the Lewis and Clark exposition.

Two freight cars, bearing the cream of Wisconsin's educational exhibit at St. Louis, are on their way to Portland, where the exhibits will be shown at the Lewis and Clark centennial.

A most interesting feature of the Lewis and Clark fair will be a miniature reproduction of a complete mine in operation, with its tunnel, shaft, hoist, cars and track, drills, stamp, mills and camp.

The Alaskan exhibit at the Lewis and Clark centennial will show a complete display of fisheries, mines and oils, together with various curios from the time of the Russian occupation.

On account of the large acreage of water at the Lewis and Clark exposition, special attention will be given to water sports. Mimic naval battles, on a scale impossible at previous expositions, will be held during the fair.

The Oregon Territory, which Lewis and Clark opened up to settlers a hundred years ago, when they made their expedition, which will be commemorated at the Lewis and Clark fair, had a population in 1900 of 1,093,441. In 1840 the population was only 747,524.

The exhibit which Missouri will send to the Lewis and Clark exposition will be one that could not be duplicated for \$300,000. It will consist of the cream of Missouri's display at the Louisiana Purchase exposition, supplemented by an elaborate display collected for the Western world's fair.

TOWN OF TURNER MAY NOT BE WHERE IT IS

The people of Turner are said to be stirred up over the question of where they are living, or whether they are living in the right place. It is said that someone has discovered that the town site is half a mile east from where it was located and platted by the original owners.

County Surveyor Herriek was ignorant of any trouble, and said that he

had not been consulted by the parties. He thought that the townsite was correct, and the affair was a sort of tempest in a teapot.

Sheriff Culver was of the same opinion, having surveyed for several years in that vicinity. He could not state positively, but was sure that some mistake existed in the minds of the people making the charges.

STATE NEWS

The city of Portland defeated the ordinance allowing saloons to keep open all night. It was introduced by Councilman Fred T. Merrill, and lacked one vote of the necessary number to carry it.

The Open Air Sanatorium for consumptives was opened near Portland yesterday. The tents and buildings occupy a slightly place overlooking the Willamette river, near the town of Milwaukie.

The total tax levy of Multnomah county for the year 1905 will be 40 mills. It is heavier than anticipated a short time ago by the officials.

The board of regents of the O. A. C. removed the ban placed on the football team of that institution, which prohibited the team from playing with athletic clubs.

Harmon Ensley, a young man of Eugene, started for Idaho by team last November, and has not been heard from. His father has commenced a search for him, as it is thought that he is the victim of foul play. His family had preceded him to Idaho.

McMinnville has organized a development league, and will get in line for the promotion of Oregon industries. It is affiliated with the other Richardson clubs in the state.

A strong lobby will come from Baker county, to ask the legislature to amend or repeal the Eddy law, taxing corporations.

Frank M. Harris, agent for a sewing machine company at Oregon City, is said to be short several hundred dollars in his accounts. He was recently married, but left town a few days, and said that he was going into the country on business. He has not returned.

The city of Albany threatens to be depopulated when the federal grand jury reconvenes in Portland January 10th. A large number of subpoenas have been issued and served. The list includes many homesteaders and others having interests in the timber lands in Linn and Lincoln counties.

The hunters of Albany held a meeting and adopted the following recommendations regarding the game laws: "There should be a hunter's license of about \$1 per annum for resident hunters, and a larger sum for non-residents; upland birds should be hunted with dogs; running of deer with hounds should be prohibited; the sale of any game in the markets of the state should be prohibited; bating of ducks and other fowl should be prohibited; dogs should be made personal property and receive the protection of law, as does other personal property."

Refrigerator Collapsed.

Berlin, Jan. 5.—The collapse of a refrigerator at a brewery at Coburg, Germany, today caused the death of five workmen. Four were injured, two fatally.

Deferred Decision.

New York, Jan. 5.—Justice Grenbaum announced at 2 o'clock this afternoon that he would give a decision in the matter of bail for Nan Patterson later in the day or tomorrow.

CIRCUIT COURT IS BUSY

Department No. 1 of the circuit court was in session today hearing the case of Appollonia Gehlen, et al., vs. John McKinney. This is an appeal from the justice court, and the arguments were in progress at press time.

The case of Geo. J. Wolfer vs. W. S. Hurst and H. A. Hinkle was decided in favor of the plaintiff, the defendants resting on a motion for non-suit, after the introduction of the plaintiff's testimony. The court directed a verdict, finding the defendants guilty of retaining and occupying lands belonging to the plaintiff. The defendants have until January 7th to file a motion to set aside the judgment for a new trial.
