WOMAN NAMED BY COURT

The county court of Clatsop county has appointed Mrs. C. A. Gearhart to fill the office of superintendent of schools of that county, in place of Prof. H. S. Lyman, deceased.

The question of the eligibility of a woman to a county office in the state of Oregon was decided by the supreme court in 1896, in the case brought by J. L. Carter against Nellie M. Stevens, to oust her from the office of school superintendent of Umatilla county, and the court held that, under the constitution of the state, a woman cannot hold any office in the state.

Mrs. Stevens was duly nominated and elected to the office over Carter, but he refused to recognize her right to hold it, and, after several battles in the courts over the possession of the books, she was removed from the place, and her term filled by Carter, her unsuccessful opponent.

Since that time no woman has been appointed by any party to office, and the appointment by the Clatsop county court is the first step looking to a renewal of the controversy.

Police Court Doings.

Two hobos and a drunk comprised Judges Moore's police court docket this morning, and were quickly disposed of. The hobos giving the name of Geane Ferguson and Elmer Lambert, were charged with keeping late hours and were fined \$5 each, but V's appeared to be a minus quantity in the city bastille. C. H. Baldwin, who had been drinking "sody wather," or some other lubricant, was likewise fined \$5 and went to jail in default of the sum.

Editorial Association.

A meeting of the executive committee of the National Editorial Association has been called, to be held in Indianapolis, Ind., February 7, 8, 1905. The date for the national convention will be decided on at this meeting, as well as several other important questions. Editor W. J. Clarke, of the Gervais Star, is the committeeman for Oregon.

Honorary Appointment.

Governor Chamberlain appointed R. C. Clement, of Duluth, Minnesota, as immigration commissioner for the state of Oregon in Minnesota. This office is simply honorary, and Mr. Clement will serve without pay or remuneration of any kind.
