Second—He appoints Mary P. Logan and John B. Waldo executors without bonds.

Third—He desires, if his executors deem it best, that his estate be converted into cash to be divided.

The property of which the estate is comprised is situated in Tillamook and Marion counties and is valued at about \$1500.

GOLD SAVING MACHINE

Dozens of machines have been invented to save the flour gold along the Oregon and California beaches, and many machines which have cost thousands of dollars, and in some cases the inventors have been financially ruined, now lie strewn along the beach, but none have yet been successful.

At last Mr. J. H. Russell, of the Gold Bar Mining Company, of Lower Rogue River, has perfected a concentrating device, which he says effects remarkable saving of exceedingly fine values. He says tests with the machine on ocean sands demonstrated that he could separate the flour gold by water concentration. This result required two years of hard work, as the tendency of values to float defied ordinary methods applying the specific gravity principle. By combining well-known methods and using Brussels carpet in a novel manner, the inventor states that he has achieved a success which he thinks will ultimately command wide attention. Patents have been issued for the device, and in due time it is the purpose to make demonstrations on a larger scale, and under the supervision of men who are interested in this great problem of separating gold from fine slimes.

If the new device will accomplish what Mr. Russell claims for it, the beach mining problem will be solved, and thousands of dollars will be added to the mineral resources of Oregon.

CIRCUIT COURT TRIALS

The case of P. Levy vs. T. Aufrance was tried yesterday afternoon in Department No. 1 of the circuit court, and the jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff and damages were allowed in the amount of one dollar. Carson, Adams & Cannon were retained as attorney for plaintiff and Bigger & Corby for defendants.

This morning session was opened with the trial of John James White and a verdict of guilty was returned by the jury. Judgment is to be pronounced Tuesday, January 10. White broke into the house of Henry Martin Stahl, near Gervais, December 14, 1904, and stole a suit of clothes valued at \$15. District Attorney McNary appeared for the state and W. H. Holmes for the defendant.

In the case of A. C. Keene against his sister, Nancy J. Eldridge, a motion was filed by defendant for non-

suit and was allowed by the court. D'Arcy & Bingham appeared for plaintiff and Carson, Adams & Cannon for defendants.
