PRIZE ESSAYS WANTED

The Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution is an organization composed of descendants of those who assisted in establishing American independence. Any male descendant of such ancestor is eligible to admission into the society. Its objects are purely patriotic and historical. One of them is to stimulate interest in the history of the American Revolution, loyalty to its principles. For this purpose the society offers three prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10, respectively for the best essay written by any student under 21 years of age, in any public school in Oregon, on either of the following two American Revolutionary subjects:

1. The Quebec campaign.
2. The co-operation of the French, how brought about and the results.

Essays are limited in length to 2500 words, must be written on legal cap paper, on one side of the paper, in the student's own handwriting, and must be accompanied by the certificate of the principal of the school attended by the author to the effect that the author is a bona fide student in the school, and has been in attendance therein not less than six weeks during the school year of 1904-05. Essays may be forwarded to the chairman of the committee in charge of General Thomas M. Anderson, 251 North Twenty-fourth street, Portland, so as to reach him not later than February 1, 1905. In awarding the prizes the committee will be governed by these three conditions:

1. Historical accuracy.
2. Manner of treatment.
3. Orthography, grammar, syntax and punctuation.

Any additional information relative to the competition which may be desired will be cheerfully furnished by the chairman of the committee. The essay which is awarded the first prize will be published in full, with the name of the author, in the public press.
