

WHO ARE MEN OF MARK

Senators and Representatives Who Have Seen Service

Hon. A. A. Bailey, who is a linotype operator on the Oregonian, was a member of the house at the last session.

Hon. W. M. Blakely, of Umatilla, was also a member of the last house, is the only Democrat of that organization who was returned to this. Mr. Blakely was sheriff of his county for four years.

Senator B. A. Booth belongs to a family of politicians. Two years ago his brother, W. M. Booth, who is a Democrat, was elected county judge of Crook county, a Republican county, and J. O. Booth, who is also his brother, was elected county judge of Josephine county, although he is a Democrat and the county is considered Republican. Still another brother of the senator, J. H. Booth, a Republican, was appointed register of the Roseburg land office.

Senator A. M. Miller, of Linn, was a member of the house in 1893.

Hon. J. N. Burgess returns to the house from Wasco county.

Schiller B. Herman, son of Binger Herman, was a member of the last house.

Senator O. W. Hodson was a member of the last house and returns to the senate from Multnomah and Clackamas counties.

Hon. W. R. Hudson, a member of the last house, was returned to this, from Multnomah county.

Hon. C. G. Huntley, a member from the county made famous by Brownell, was a member of the last house.

Hon. T. B. Kay, candidate for speaker, made a reputation as the watchdog of the treasury in the last house. He fought jobs tooth and toe and may yet be rewarded for his pertinacity by the people.

Senator E. W. Nottingham, a member of the last house from Multnomah was elected to the senate last June as a Roosevelt Republican, the only candidate on the ticket.

Senator N. Wheaton, a member of the last house from Wasco, was elected to the senate from that county last June.

Hon. R. C. Smith, a Democratic member from Josephine, was a Republican member of the house from that county in the 1895 session, when Dolph failed of an election to the United States senate, and stood by Dolph on every ballot.

Hon. P. D. Cornett, member of the house from Linn, last June picked up the lost Republican vote that kept Senator Percy R. Kelly at home two years ago. Mr. Cornett passed under the wire with one more vote to his credit than had his Democratic opponent, while in his race Kelly lost by the same number.

Hon. George W. Holcomb, who is in the house from Multnomah and Clackamas as a Republican, was a member of the house in 1901 as a representative of the Citizens' party. They voted for John R. Mitchell on the last ballot.

In the senate are three senators elected to fill vacancies caused by resignation. P. Avery, of Benton, takes the place of John D. Daly, who as appointed U. S. surveyor general of Oregon, J. Tuttle, of Clatsop, takes the place of C. W. Fulton, the latter having been elected to the United States senate, and Henry W. Cox, of Multnomah was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Henry E. McGinn, who tired of official life.

Bowen, of New York, Treasurer John Murray, of New York, and Secretary William Tobson, of North Adams, Mass., were in their places. BACK TO WORK.

Hermann Will Not Neglect Business Because of Indictment.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Representative Hermann reached Washington late Saturday night. When seen at his home he gave out the following formal statement, which he declared, contained all he wished to say at present:

"Having stated my position to the Oregon papers just before leaving Portland, there is nothing further to add at the present time. Of course, I shall resume my duties in the house, and take active part in my committees as soon as I can overtake the large correspondence and department work which has accumulated during the weeks of the holiday recess and my visit to Oregon. I have just received a call to attend the Indian committee, and another to vote on the currency bill. Referring to the criver and harbor appropriation, which so greatly affects Oregon welfare, I am led to believe since my return that there will be no bill at this session, owing to the impaired surplus in the treasury.

LAND FRAUD CASES

As Reviewed by the Lincoln County Reporter

Under Mr. Heney's able management the so-called land frauds of western Oregon are getting top heavy.

Mr. Heney began with a hose, which shows some fraud, and he actually secured a conviction of the McKinley-Puter-Watson combine on the charge of conspiracy, and from this conviction he, through the testimony of these convicted felons, is reaching out for more worlds to conquer, chief of which is our senior senator and Mr. Hermann, and besides these two gentlemen he is now going after the individual homesteader.

The whole prosecution is now in somewhat the shape of a funnel sitting on its small end. It's top heavy, and this paper predicts that Mr. Heney will secure few more conviction.

The people will not stand for this show of spitzwork and spleen. The people do not care whether Mr. Hitchcock is vindicated or not.

The people have no interest in Mr. Hitchcock vindicating his policy and continuing himself in office. The people of this great Republican state, God pity them, are praying for Mr. Hitchcock's dismissal from the position.

If there is a combination of people banded together to defraud the government out of her lands they should be prosecuted and convicted. This is correct, but it should not be done solely for the purpose of vindication and spite.

With regard to the individual homesteaders, it is a well-known fact that Mr. Hitchcock knows that Kansas, Nebraska, the two Dakotas and Michigan and the whole of the middle west has been settled in the same manner as this western Oregon country. The homesteader has gone into the woods, far away from civilization, and located upon a claim, has built himself a cabin, has cleared a little land, has existed upon it for a few months, has left it for a few months to earn a few dollars to enable him to exist upon his homestead for a few months more, and then more work and then more existing ad infinitum. In the meantime, if he be a man of a family, he leaves his family in the nearest neighborhood, where there are some advantages of schools, etc., his wife and perchance his children at intervals taking long horseback and foot trips in with him to the homestead, trying in their weakness to comply with Mr. Hitchcock's rules and regulations and yet preserve their manhood and womanhood and their sanity.

A man who would take his wife and children into the far backwoods, away from any part of civilization, away from schools and churches and keep them there for Mr. Hitchcock five years is worse than a felon. It tends to insanity and the breeding of idiots.

We do not believe that it was the intention of the framers of the homestead laws to encourage ignorance and superstition, and God knows that a strict enforcement of the homestead laws, according to Hitchcock, breeds nothing else.

As the ruling now is, no one but those who are intellectually weak and reveling in ignorance can afford to comply with Hitchcock's rulings with regard to remote homestead lands.

We are reliably informed that Mr. Heney is prosecuting a large number of Linn county homesteaders who took up lands in the foothills of the Cascade range with a view of cancelling their homesteads and prosecuting them criminally, if possible to get them. All this outside of the so-called McKinley-Puter frauds.

Dr. W. H. Davis, of Albany, one of her best citizens, her present mayor and one of the best men the sun ever shone upon, has been indicted by this man Heney because he (Davis) was unfortunate enough to be an educated American citizen and tried to avail himself of the homestead law.

We care nothing about the prosecution of the McKinley-Puter land fraud, that's their business.

We care nothing about the prosecution and prosecution of Mr. Mitchell or Mr. Hermann, they are simply able to take care of themselves, but when it comes to a wholesale prosecution and persecution of the homesteaders of this country "there is going to something drop," the thing has become top heavy. Again we predict that Mr. Heney will not secure another conviction, criminally, of course. Mr. Hitchcock, through his (able) agents, can and will probably cancel all our homesteaders, and then what?
