NATURAL SCIENCE

The increasing demand for platinum; particularly for use in the manufacture of gas mantles, has led to the invention of a process of saving the fine powdery grains of this metal found in the gold placer deposits of Southern Oregon and elsewhere. The platinum being a state of very fine division, almost the form of dust, will not settle in a placer sluice so long as the water is briskly stirred. After the metal-bearing water has passed over a riffle-table, on which nearly all the gold settles, it is drawn more slowly over a coco-mat riffle, on which platinum settles, and is then collected by rinsing the coco-mats over tanks. Formerly the platinum was all wasted, at first because its identity was not recognized, and afterwards because no process was then known for saving it.

The ability of electrically driven trains to surmount grades impracticable to steam engines is to be taken advantage of in constructing a new railway over the Alps, from Turin in Italy to Martigny, in Switzerland. The maximum gradient is to be 1 in 20, and the motive power is to be derived from Alpine waterfalls. There will be one tunnel under the Paradise Mountain. The total length of the line will be 97 1/2 miles, much shorter than any of the existing steam roads connecting Central Europe with Northwest Italy.

Students of the science of weather are giving greater attention than formerly to the phenomena of the atmosphere high above the earth's surface. Explorations of the upper air with kites and balloons have had results which have made evident once more the great value of mountain observatories. The weather bureau is now planning a great center of meteorological research to be placed on Mount Weather, in the Blue Ridge Mountains, six miles from Bluemont, Virginia. A new theory of the nature of cyclones and anti-cyclones is expected to result from the investigations now going on.

Nearly 12,000,000 tons of coal per year are now saved, according to the estimates of Mr. A. A. Campbell Swinton, by the use of water-power for the production of electricity. Statistics collected by him show that, up to last August, about 1,500,000 horse-power for electrical work was being generated from water-power, and of this total nearly one-third belonged to the United States. In England only 12,000 horse-power is thus developed.

In the eastern part of the great forest region of Central Africa, where the akapi was discovered, Mr. R. Meinertzhagen has recently killed specimens of hitherto unclassified species of wild swine, for which the popular name "forest hog" has been suggested. It bears much resemblance to the warthog, but is less hideous in the shape of its skull and the arrangement of its teeth. It is also more abundantly clothed with black hair. As in the case of the okapi, the late Sir H. M. Stanley heard of the existence of this hog, but did not see specimens of it.

The captain of the German steamer Progress, which arrived in Chefo last evening from Vladivostok, says that Vladivostok will prove a stronger fortress than that of Port Arthur.

A Tokio dispatch states that some of the sunken ships are salvageable, and an effort will be made to raise them.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPH STATIONS

Five to Be Established Along the Pacific Coast

Five wireless telegraph stations will probably be established along the Washington, Oregon and Northern California coast in the near future. The navy department has ordered a joint report from Major William C. Langfitt, corps of engineers, U. S. A., who has charge of all government improvement work in Oregon, and Captain L. C. Heilner, United States lighthouse inspector on the advisability of using the lighthouse stations for wireless telegraph stations.

The location of the stations as practically decided by the navy department are Admiralty Head and Point Wilson, at the entrance of Puget Sound; Cape Flattery, at the entrance to the Strait of Juan de Fuca; Cape Disappointment, near North Head at the entrance to the Columbia river, and Cape Blanco on the Northern California coast.

Captain Heilner, in his report on the matter, will recommend the use of lighthouse stations for telegraph stations. The report will be made out and forwarded to Washington, D. C., tomorrow according to the present intention of the inspector. A conference between himself and Major Langfitt, who were appointed a board to consider the matter, was held this morning.

The new stations are a part of the general plan of defense for the country in time of war, and the project of establishing them is, therefore, a war measure. However, the stations will probably be equipped with weather bureau apparatuses, and thus will aid materially in forecasting the weather of the Northwest.

It is not known what system of wireless telegraph will be used, what the cost of installing will be, how many men will be required to handle the stations, or the number of new buildings, or the date which will mark the commencement of the work of installation, but it is almost a settled fact that they will be established. When they are in operation they will be the only wireless telegraph stations north of San Francisco on the Pacific coast of the United States.

A Double Triumph.

At Port Arthur the Japanese forces destroyed a powerful fleet, as well as captured a stronghold. At the instant war was declared they tried to torpedo the Russian ships in the harbor, their plans having been secretly matured in advance. Some damage was done, but not sufficient to justify the long inaction and waiting tactics of the Russian admirals. The czar's fleet should have come out and tried conclusions in a general engagement. It might possibly have been destroyed in battle, but it is at the bottom of the sea without anything deserving the name of a resolute fight. If the Russians had taken the offensive with the navy after the Japanese lost a battleship and two cruisers in quick succession from mines, they had at least an even chance to win, unless wishing to confess that they were hopelessly inferior to the enemy in naval skill and daring.

The Russian fleet was finally cornered where it could not escape a rain of shells from a land battery, which is an almost discreditable plight. By that time it had been so weakened by timorous piecemeal movements that it was helpless, so the Russians themselves opened the valves of their ships, and finally blew them up. From first to last the Russian naval management was tame, not to say lacking in courageous energy. The Japanese, on their part, took all possible risks in night torpedo attacks, and their repeated efforts to close the harbor with old hulks are without a parallel on the same scale. Russia's naval record at Port Arthur is a humiliating failure.—Globe-Democrat.

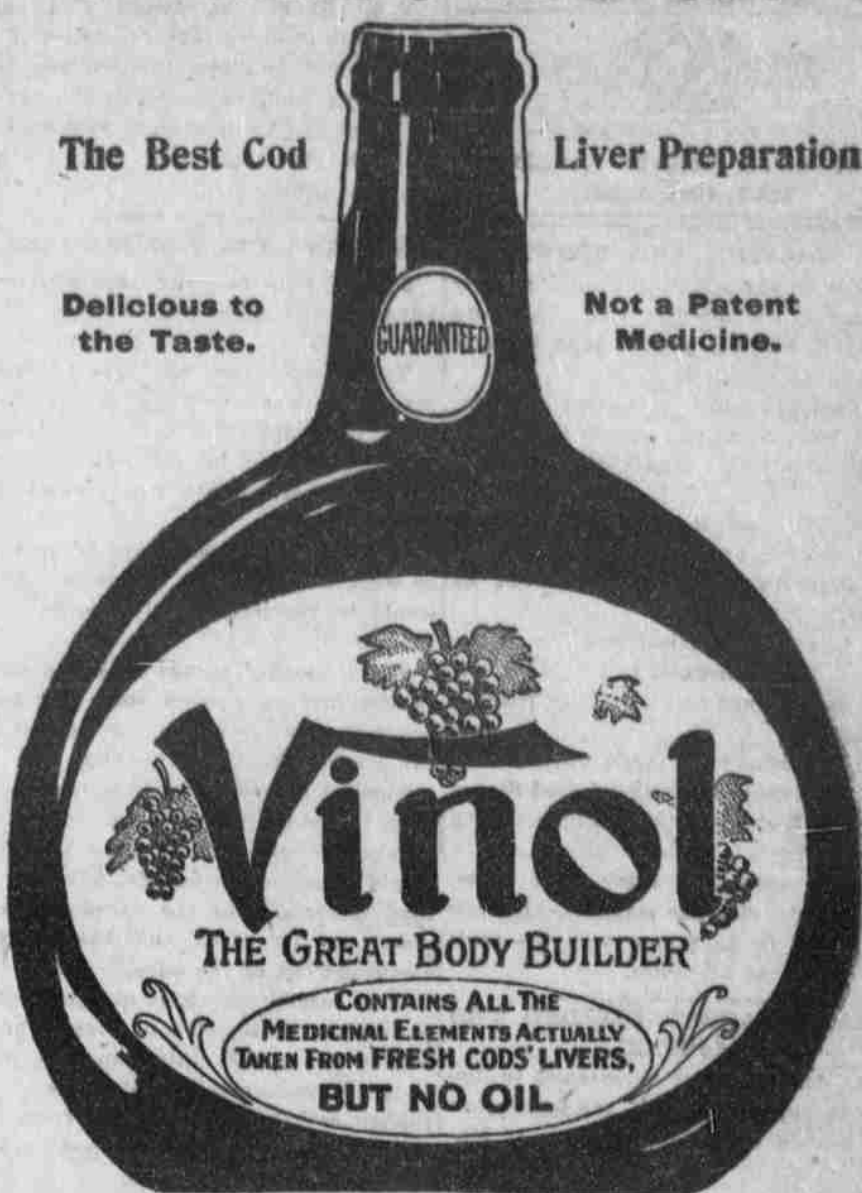
