WOODMEN OF THE WORLD

Will Undertake One of the Biggest Campaigns in Their History

F. B. Tichner, state organizer for the Woodmen of the World, is in the city today, looking after the interests of his order. Mr. Tichner is arranging for a Woodmen campaign which will exceed anything that has heretofore been done in the organizing line in Oregon. Candidates from various lodges from Oregon City to Cottage Grove will be initiated in Albany, February 25. It is expected that on this date a class of 400 will be initiated, and one of the biggest demonstrations for Woodcraft ever held in the West will take place there. Every band from Cottage Grove to Oregon City will be engaged for this big gathering. Special passenger rates will be announced later.

This will be the biggest gathering of one of the fraternal orders ever held in Oregon. Mr. Tichner has the reputation of carrying out successfully Woodmen work on a large scale.

Guard to Get Uniforms.

At last, after many delays, it is thought that the Oregon National Guard will be equipped with the much-needed new uniforms. The issue will be two uniforms to each enlisted man, as at present, one a blue dress uniform and the other the khaki or olive drab, to be used in the field as a service uniform.

Adjutant-General Finzer, in whose hands the matter rests, says that, if possible, he will have them made by some mill inside the state, but if the cost is too great he will not be able to patronize home industry. The issue is expected to be made in about four months.

A Prehistoric City.

A discovery has been made in the Andes mountains, 250 miles from Aranco, Chili, a city deserted for 2000 years, but once inhabited, presumably by Aztecs of much larger stature than those who lived in Central America, according to the story told by two men just returned from Chili. They expect that their story will add to scientific knowledge of South American prehistoric races, and are now hurrying east to present the result of their researches to American and German scientists.

The discoverers of the ancient city are Prof. Emil von Burgues of Berlin, a famous archaeologist of Germany, and William J. Hemmway of New York, who has spent several years exploring South America. At the head of a party of five they have spent a year in South America on a special expedition of exploration. The deserted city was found in a small valley, reached only after weeks of hardships. It was in an excellent state of preservation, the explorers finding stone houses, supposed to have been erected 20 centuries ago, crumbling and grown over with mosses and shrubs, yet standing upright. Ancient tools of husbandry, household implements of stone and hermetically sealed groves give evidence of a high state of civilization. A large quantity of articles are being taken east. The city comprised 1500 souls. Von Burgues believes that either flood or disease exterminated the prehistoric race, probably the latter.
