DALLES-CEILO CANAL

Board Report on Progress and Expense of Construction

Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Dunbar and State Treasurer Moore as the Board of Commissioners of Canals and Locks of the State of Oregon, have filed their report to the Twenty-Third Legislature. They report in part as follows:

The United States, in aid of the navigation of the Columbia River, authorized the improvement thereof between the foot of the Dalles Rapids and the head of Celilo Falls by means of a boat canal and improvement of the channel of the river.

The act of the legislature appropriated the sum of \$100,000 to be expended in procuring by purchase, agreement, or condemnation the right of way and release from damages required by the United States.

Major W. C. Langfitt, United States Engineer in charge of the authorized improvement, has reduced the right of way wherever possible, and has made concessions which reduced the expense to the state in acquiring the right of way.

The right of way required by the United States extends from what is known as the Big Eddy in the Columbia River, three miles above the Dalles to the head of Celilo Falls, a distance of 46,400 feet, or about eight and three-fourth miles.

The expense for attorney's fee, abstract of titles and costs of suits, etc., have amounted to \$919.00, making a total expenditure to January 4, 1905, \$70,349.75, leaving a balance of \$29,650.25.

The Board expects shortly to convey and deliver to the United States the lands so far acquired.
