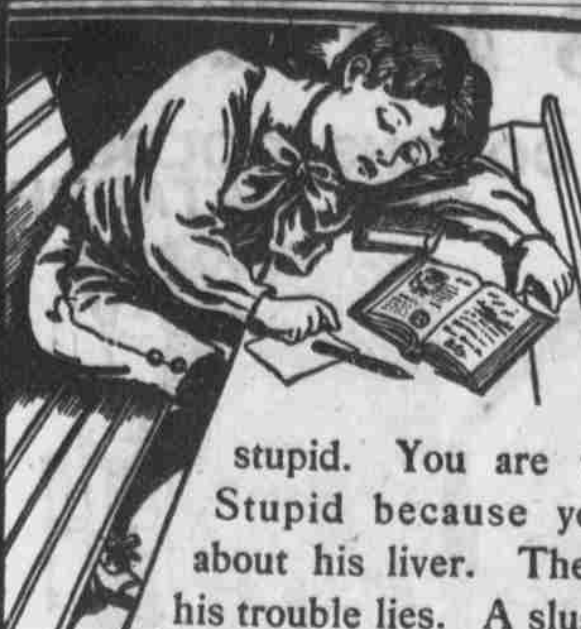

PEARY'S NEW SCHEME

Will Keep in Telegraphic Com-
munication by Wireless

New York, Jan. 14.—At the New York navy yard work has begun on a wireless telegraph station to enable Commander Robert E. Peary to keep in touch with civilization during his next attempt to plant the Stars and Stripes at the north pole. According to the plans just made public, Commander Peary will erect wireless stations after he leaves the Labrador coast, to keep in touch with the nearest station on the mainland as he proceeds northward. From there communication with New York will be easy. The vessel of the expedition will be forced to the northern coast of Greenland where the party will go into winter quarters. This is only about four hundred and fifty miles from the pole.

Not only will the wireless stations enable Commander Peary to communicate the result of his work from day to day and the condition of the expedition to his backers in this country, but he believes it will sustain the morals of the party, which always suffers in the long and monotonous Arctic nights when there is seldom anything for the explorers to do. In many cases the horrors and monotony of the six months' night have not only caused serious breaks among the members of such parties, but individuals have been driven temporarily insane.

BETTER THAN CHAMPAGNE

Lewis and Clark Fair Notes.

Vermont's building at the Lewis and Clark's Centennial will be a reproduction of the Old Constitution House of 1777.

Hungary will have an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Centennial worth \$30,000. The exhibit will occupy 2000 square feet of space.

Costa Rica will have a fine display of coffee, hemp, cocoa and other products at the Western World's fair. The display is valued at \$20,000.

An interesting attraction for women at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be the display of the latest frocks from Paris in the French section of the manufactures building.

Egypt and Morocco will make a combined African display at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. The exhibit will cover 2500 square feet, and its value will be \$225,000.

The hatching of chickens will be shown to the general public at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. All exhibitors of incubators will be required to make their displays operative, and at stated hours the crowds will be invited to come and see the chickens break their shells.

The piling and flooring work on the Trail and Bridge of Nations at the Lewis and Clark Centennial is now completed, and the government peninsula can now be reached by this route. The bridge spans 2000 feet of water, and is the longest bridge ever erected at an exposition.

The art display at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be of fabulous value, representing more than will be expended in building the exposition. There will be a few paintings worth at least \$100,000 each, and the aggregate value of the display will be millions of dollars.

Philadelphia, Jan. 14.—One of the most notable dinners that the Quaker City has seen in some years will take place at the Bellevue-Stratford tonight when several hundred men of national prominence will gather about the board to do honor to Congressman Henry H. Bingham of this city, the "father of the national house of representatives." The guests will include a large delegation of public men from Washington, together with others from New York, Boston, Baltimore and other points. The affair has been arranged by General Bingham's friends in celebration of his 14th consecutive election to congress. General Bingham is now the oldest member of congress in point of service.
