TWIRL**

**With Tacoma Coast League
for the Coming Base Ball
Season**

San Francisco, Jan. 14.—Mike Fisher, manager of the Tacoma Coast league, signed Emerson, the schoolboy phenomenon of San Jose, as a member of his pitching staff. In announcing his coup Fisher said:

"I am going to have Emerson, but not until June. He is going to school at San Jose and he will graduate in June. From what I have seen of Emerson I feel more certain that he will make good than I did that Overall would."

Emerson is an amateur, but in the school league games in San Jose and he made a remarkable record. He is not fully developed, but a few months in the big league, it is believed, will make him a finished artist.

(Emerson pitched star ball for the Salem team last season in the Oregon State League, and later with the Washington league, and can hardly be called an amateur, although he has never played with any of the big leagues, confining his work to the schools and "brush" leagues. Emo's many friends in this city are delighted to hear of his success, and firmly believe that he will carry off all the honors in sight during the coming season while playing with the big league.)

Adventures of Dr. Hall.

The Lake View stage driver tells a wonderful story of the adventures of Dr. Hall, of Lakeview, who was lost in the desert in Warner's Valley, spent the night in a fierce snowstorm, nearly freezing to death, and beset by howling bands of wolves for hours. Dr. Hall was called to visit a patient in Warner Valley, and left in a sleigh for home. When out about 10 miles he encountered a blinding snow storm, and the trail was soon obliterated. His horse became lost and wandered about seeking shelter, frequently falling into deep gullies of snow. After midnight he was surrounded by coyotes, who, through starvation, were bolder than they usually are, and attacked the horse, and were only driven off with the approach of daylight. **COOK
WON
COIN**

**While Shooting Craps and Is
Arrested for Lar-
ceny**

C. H. Cook, who is accused of the larceny of \$60 from his room mate, E. Sampson, while the two men were working on the hop yard conducted by Mr. Dodge for Julius Pincus, of this city, was given a preliminary hearing this morning before Judge Turner, and bound over to the next term of the circuit court under \$500 bail. The prisoner seems to be out of funds at present, and will doubtless remain in jail in default of the sum.

Julius Pincus, who hired Cook to go to work on December 23, 1904, was the first witness called, and he testified that at the time he went to work the prisoner was totally "broke," and that he, Pincus, had to advance him the money to buy his blankets with.

Mr. Gibson, a wood cutter, was the next witness called, and stated that Cook had made the statement to him that they couldn't prove that he took the money which Sampson lost, but that he never denied it to witness. He also said that when he told Cook that Sampson was going to keep his blankets he said: "Let him keep them; I don't care." He stated that Cook told him that he had \$50 on Monday, the 9th.

L. J. Stanton, the next witness, said that he saw Sampson have a sum of money over \$25 the night of December 31st, and that Sampson was drunk and Cook sober, and the last he saw of Sampson was Cook leading him home. Cook came back later in the evening.

Deputy Sheriff H. P. Minto was next called, and said that he had been making investigations and learned that Cook had bought a \$23 suit of clothes, the one he was wearing, on the afternoon of Tuesday, at Stockton's store. He searched the prisoner when he was arrested, and he only had about 65 cents.

Mr. Pillit, who works in Kirk's place, said that the prisoner was in the place on Monday and Tuesday, and he was not sure whether he saw in there Wednesday or not. He spent \$4 or \$5, and Monday night deposited \$20 with Pillit, and did not get it again until Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock. Minto was again called by District Attorney McNary, and he stated that the prisoner had bought the clothes before 7 o'clock in the evening.

Cook, the prisoner, next took the stand, the case of the prosecution being all in, and stated that he went to a dance at the hop yard on New Year's eve, and stayed sober, while Sampson, who was with him, got uncontrollably drunk, and started to raise a disturbance, so he, Cook, took him home and put him to bed, and went to bed himself, but wanted to go back and have a good time at the dance, so he arose again and went back; he also remembered that he left his hat at the dance hall. When he arrived, most of the girls had gone home, so he did not stay long, but proceeded to go back to bed again. The next morning Sampson discovered that he had lost his money, and at once suggested that he had dropped it while drunk the night before, and Cook went back with him to look for it, but they couldn't find it. He stated that he came to town Monday night with \$1.50, and was going to the Edison theatre, but he went to several gambling houses, and shot craps, and won the money that he bought the clothes with. When cross-examined by Mr. McNary he stated he went into several different gambling houses, and told which games he played at different times, and it seems from his testimony that he must have had good luck, for he only quit one game without winning from \$5 to \$10, and that time he "broke even." He stated in detail where he won and where he won it until he reached the sum of \$25, but he then became so deeply under the influence of liquor that he could not account for the other \$25.
