

HINKS SHOVE QUEER

Seattle, Jan. 16.—Capt. B. W. Bell, the government secret service, has arrested a number of counterfeit \$5 bills on the Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation of Shanghai. The bills have been circulated freely in Tacoma and Seattle and have caused much annoyance and loss to the Chinese merchants particularly. The bills payable in the local currency of English settlement, and have seldom been counterfeited before. This is practically the first time counterfeits of this kind have been circulated in the city.

The bills were, it is stated by Capt. Bell, brought over here on the Japanese steamship Quito, which arrived on the sound a couple of weeks ago. The sailors of the vessel were evidently well primed with counterfeits, for almost as soon as the vessel reached the bills began to get in circulation throughout Tacoma, and quickly reached this city.

The bills are considerably larger than the American currency, and are of a shape almost square. Both Chinese and English lettering appear on them and they are purported to be signed by W. A. Gardiner manager of the bank. So intricate is the design of the bill that it is considered particularly difficult to counterfeit. Those in circulation, however, are well done and display infinite patience in the manufacture. The correct paper is used, and the most suspicious part of the bill on first sight is the presswork, which does not show up plainly.

FUNERAL SERVICES

of the Late Mrs. Lulu Clark-Ward, Who Died at Ashland, January 12, 1905.

Mrs. Lulu Clark-Ward died at her home in Ashland, Oregon, January 12, 1905. The remains arrived in Salem Saturday morning, accompanied by the sorrowing mother, Mrs. Daniel Clark, whose late husband was one of Oregon's respected pioneers. The beloved and heart-broken husband and children were unable to be present, owing to the severe illness of both Mr. Ward and the 13-year-old son, Chester. Lulu Clark was born April 22, 1872, and was 33 years old at the time of her death. She was married about 15 years ago to B. C. Ward, and to this happy union was born two children, Chester, aged 13 and Lorene, aged 11, both of whom live to mourn the loss of a loving mother. Mrs. Ward became a member of the First Christian church in Salem at the age of 13 years, and her friends attest to the high standard of her Christian character. No higher tribute can be paid to her memory than this "By their fruits shall ye know them."

A short time before her death, when she knew that the end was near, she called her children and loved ones to her bedside, and bade them farewell, after urging them to meet her beyond the vale of tears.

The funeral obsequies were held at the First Christian church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p. m., conducted by the pastor, Dr. Davis Erett. The Stalwart quartet rendered in a very beautiful and touching manner "Beautiful Country," "Last Hope" and "Art Thou Weary?" The church was filled with friends, many of them companions of her early childhood, who came to lay a flower on her casket, and pay a last tribute to the memory of one who had been so early called away. Interment was made in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, by the side of her deceased father.

Besides the mother, husband and children, deceased leaves two brothers, Dr. Dan Clark, of Silverton, and Rollo Clark, of Salem, and one sister, Mrs. Otilia Pearson, of Salem.

The Spirit of New Japan.

Japan's triumph has been so complete, so dramatic, that it sets us wondering as to the secret of this magic. Yet in reality many finely balanced powers have contributed to this result, and we might have found them all in Japan for generations had we had the knowledge and the insight. We may be certain that the surface hardness which the fierce contest of material life have imposed upon Japan are for a time only, and that, once her national well-being is assured, the old beauty and idealism will once more shine through.—Harpers Weekly.

Death at Portland.

David Jay, of Portland, a long-time resident of Portland and manufacturer of carriages, died this morning, after a slow illness. Mr. Jay is the father of Mrs. J. G. Graham, of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Graham will be present at the funeral.

OREGON'S STATE FLOWER

In connection with the recent gifts of Oregon grape sent by the Portland Commercial Club to prominent Eastern states as the state flower of Oregon. H. Himes gives an interesting account of the origin of the shrub, and its adoption as the state flower of Oregon. The first known reference to the shrub is in Parsh's "Flora of North America," published by James Black & Son, London, England, 1816, and it is there first called "Oregon Grape or Holly-leaved Barberry."

"While considered a shrub the Oregon grape sometimes attains a height of 17 feet, with a diameter of four and a half inches," says Mr. Himes. "I have a sample of that size in my custody now. The flower blooms in April, is very handsome, though delicate, and is a bright lemon yellow in color. The fruit grows in small clusters, resembles small dark purple grapes, and, while edible, is very sour, but makes excellent jelly."

"It was upon my motion, at a meeting of the Oregon Horticultural Society in 1890 that the question of adopting a state flower was first raised, my personal choice being the Oregon grape on account of its permanent leafage in variegated colors, according to its exposure to the sun, and its marvelous adaptation for decorative purposes at all seasons of the year. After consideration by the above society for two years in which the claims of other flowers were urged, it was adopted on July 18, 1892. The Women's Federated Clubs of Oregon secured the passage of resolutions by both houses of the state legislature of Oregon, 1899, formally declaring the Oregon grape to be the state flower."

Well-Known Farmer Dead.

G. B. Miller, a well-known wealthy farmer of Marion county, died Sunday night, January 15th, at his home near Gervais, aged 76 years. Deceased leaves a wife and 12 children, three sons and one daughter by his first wife and seven daughters and one son by his second wife. He was an old pioneer of Oregon, and honored and respected by all his neighbors and acquaintances. His daughters, the Misses Madeline, Mirine, Imogene and Cora are well known in this city, where they attend school during the winter. One son, Brantford, also attends school here.

The funeral will be held at the farm residence Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, and the remains interred in the Fairfield cemetery.

Refused Shelter, Then Shot.

Because he requested a farmer to give him shelter from the cold, Everett Owen declares he was driven from the place at the point of a shotgun and finally shot. He was brought to Pendleton suffering from a gunshot in the left leg and is now in St. Anthony's hospital. Owen is a stranger and without money, but he tells a straightforward story and the officers are at a loss to account for the supposed action of his assailant.

The matter has not yet been brought to the attention of the district attorney's office. Owen declares that he approached a farmhouse near Barnhart station about 8 o'clock, at night. After repeatedly knocking on the door it was opened and he stepped within the room and asked for a night's lodging. He alleges that one of the two men in the place seized a gun and with an oath ordered him away, and immediately after shot him.

The injured man was found yesterday by a farmer, who brought him to town. The name of the man who did the shooting is said to be Thomas. It is believed he mistook Owen for a robber. Owen's injuries are in the calf of the leg, and were caused by small birdshot.

New Use for Alfalfa.

If you have a large crop of alfalfa, and haven't sufficient cattle to feed it to and prices happen to be a little low, don't get discouraged, just ship it to Omaha where it is worth \$12 to \$14 a ton raw. On the Missouri river, too, they have a patent method of grinding and baking alfalfa into a meal mixed with a nutritious, sticky substance, and makes the most fattening, economical feed for stock ever invented, especially when fed with dried blood cakes. The alfalfa condenses into small space and the cakes represent the concentration of many tons of materials and is just as effective in feeding, and cheaper to handle, than twice the represented tonnage of hay. Alfalfa is also used in the manufacture of Diamond Dyes.

Three Men Burned to Death. Pittsburg, Jan. 16.—John Hido, Jos. Kramer and a man named Frank were burned to death in the fire which destroyed four houses at Harnaville early this morning.

COUNTY BUILDING DESTROYED

Caused Panic Among the One Thousand Employees

Chicago, Jan. 16.—A fire, originating from oils and paints, was discovered on the upper floor of the county building at 9 o'clock this morning, which caused a panic among the thousand or more employees in the building and the city hall adjoining. Four court rooms and many valuable court records were destroyed. A painter named Edwards was seriously burned and two workmen were missing. The loss has not yet been estimated.

Two painters and several firemen were seriously burned. The fire was confined to the county building. The courts have been suspended for the day.

SEWER GAS EXPLOSION

Garnett, Kan., Jan. 16.—An explosion of natural or sewer gas in the Fashing Bakery, last night, killed two men and seriously injured four. The dead are K. F. Fashing, the baker, and Frank Johnson, a farmer. The injured are: Mrs. Fashing and her two children, and Edward Stewart. The explosion aroused the whole town. The loss is \$30,000.
