"BANK"
ROBBEDBurglars Get \$300
in Plunder and
MoneyCash Register and Two Slot
Machines Destroyed

One of the boldest burglaries ever executed in the city was the raid on J. P. Rogers' saloon, "The Bank," supposedly between the hours of 6 o'clock last evening and 5 this morning. The burglars evidently gained entrance through a back window, and it is probably there was quite a gang, they stealing four demijohns, 30 bar bottles and other plunder, which would take at least three or four men to carry. They also broke open two slot machines, and one of the members of the gang must have been intimate with the mechanism of these intricate affairs, for the "paying tubes" were emptied, which feat can only be accomplished by one who thoroughly understands the machines. The total loss suffered by Mr. Rogers will probably amount to about \$300. The police are now working on a clew, and expect to land their men in short order. It is suspected that they are a band of hoboes who have been hanging around the vicinity of the city for some time. The party was very destructive, and seemingly held full sway, for the lights were turned up as usual, and no one on the outside knew of the raid until the saloon was opened this morning. The cash register was also badly broken, and was riddled of its contents, but it is thought that the robbers became scared before finishing their job, for there were several slot machines, an electric piano and a small safe in the place that were untouched.
