DUE OREGON

Governor Expects \$100,000 From Government.

Salem Special -Governor Chamber lain has begun an investigation which he believes will result in showing that the state of Oregon is entitled to receive from the United States more than \$100,000, and perhaps double that sum, on account of public land sales in this

Under the provisions of the act of ongress admitting Oregon to the Union, certain grants were made to this state, among them being the grant of the 15th and 36th sections of land for school purposes, certain other land for university purposes and still other lands for public building purposes. The fifth grant was as follows:

"That 5 per centum of the next proeeds of sales of all public lands lying within said state which shall be sold by congress after the admission of said state into the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to said state, for the purose of making public roads and interal improvements as the legislature shall direct."

This grant was a pure gift without onsideration, but was made in reorn for certain concessions made by the state. Among these concession were that property of the United shall not be taxed higher than prop-Huie Wing Sang Co .- All kinds of crty of residents. This condition was and the state passed an act granting on its part the concessions asked for by the United States in return for its grant of lands and proceeds of sales.

The state has received the 5 per cent, of the proceeds of actual sales, as provided in the grant, but the United States has been disposing of large areas of public land otherwise than by sale for eash, which conveyances were not contemplated, at the time the state made its concessions to the government. Among these conveyances are the large selections made by holders of scrip, the allotments to Inbeen invented for this interest- of public land given to corporations is chiefly on account of the large areas ing event. There is a sure way, | holding scrip that the governor thinks the state is entitled to more monfrom the government.

The Northern Pacific Railroad company, for example, held large amounts of scrip obtained by the creation of forest reserves in Washington and Montana. Because some of the company's worthless lands in those states were placed in forest reserves, the company was permitted to select in lieu of them large areas of valuable timber land in Oregon. Other holders of scrip were given the same privilege, and thus hundreds of thousands of acres of the most valuable lands were disposed of by the government without any cash being paid.

Governor Chamberlain takes the ground that when the government exchanges its lands in this state for lands in other states, Oregon has a right, under the agreement with the United States, to receive 5 per cent, of the reasonable value of the lands so distions in one or two other states, the government has fulfilled its obligations in this respect, and he expects to show that Oregon should be paid its proportion of what the proceeds would have been if the lands had been sold instead of exchanged or given away, He will take the matter up with the proper government officials at Washington.

Under the terms of the grant from the government this money must be used for road-building or for internal improvements, and under the state law must be apportioned among the several counties, according to their area. The state's portion of the proceeds of sales in 1903 was \$20,000 and in 1904 \$60,-900, Governor Chamberiain estimates that the amount to which the state is entitled on account of land disposed of in the manner described, for many years past, could not be less than \$100, 600, and would pratably be much more
