**DEMOCRAT
ENDORSES
ROOSEVELT**

On the Sonneman Resolution
Strengthening the Inter-
state Commerce Act

House Unanimously Instructs
the Oregon Delegation to
Sustain the President

In discussing the joint resolution by Sonnemann, of Douglas, to extend the power of the interstate commerce act, and to protect the people against extortion and rebate abuses by transcontinental railways, Smith, of Josephine, the Democratic leader on the floor of the house, created a sensation by offering an amendment to endorse the position of President Roosevelt on that subject.

The Sonnemann resolution was amended by instructing the Oregon delegation to sustain the President's views, as expressed in his message to congress, and passed by a unanimous vote. Smith, in an eloquent speech, eulogized the President for his courage and expressed the opinion that he was the man of the hour, who had arisen to the fullest realization of the needs of the shippers and producers against advances in freight rates caused by unlawful combinations.

Will Support the President.
Although elected as a Democrat, Representative Smith declared that he was ready to leave that party and support the President in the championship of the interests of the producers against the corporations. His remarks were applauded, and he was congratulated by many of his colleagues.

To Limit Time Compensation
of Joint Clerks

When joint committees were under consideration Mr. Smith, of Josephine, moved that the number of clerks not exceed two, nor the pay exceed \$3 per day.

Kay explained that this was not necessary, as a joint committee had decided the matter. After the explanation Smith withdrew his amendment. Smith replied to Kay that this was an old abuse, and should be abolished. It was useless to investigate all these institutions and commissions. The house would soon be imitating the senate, where each clerk had two clerks, and some had more. He demanded the ayes and noes. His motion was lost 45 to 12.

The speaker voted "no." Smith remarked: "Mr. Speaker, we are in a hopeless minority."

Senate—Wednesday Morning.

A message was read from Governor Chamberlain, announcing that he would veto any bills passed which attempted to evade the referendum clause.

A petition was read, signed by 3000 favoring raising the age of consent to 18 years. Referred.

S. B. 104—Wright, to amend McMinnville charter.

No bill that was not clearly intended for the preservation of the public peace, welfare, health and safety would receive his approval if it contained an emergency clause.

A senate resolution was adopted for a committee to investigate the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, of Portland, and other institutions of like character receiving state aid.

Resolution by Kay, of Marion, to redistrict judicial districts.
