

FORMER MAYOR HANGED

Governor Montague Asked to Interfere but Refused

Charlottesville, Va., Jan. 20.—James Samuel McCue, a former mayor of Charlottesville, was hanged in the county jail here today for the murder of his wife. The execution attracted more public attention than any previous hanging in this section of the state.

The crime for which the ex-mayor paid the death penalty occurred on the night of September 4 of last year. Mr. and Mrs. McCue had gone to church, returning home about 9 p. m. Shortly afterward Mrs. McCue's dead body, clad in a night robe, was found in a bath tub filled with water. Mr. McCue told those who came in that someone had entered the house upon their return from church; that he had been knocked senseless and his wife probably killed. An investigation led to the arrest on the charge of murder of the man who only four days before had retired from the highest office in the city.

Mr. McCue at first laid the crime to a stable boy, and offered \$1000 reward for evidence to convict the murderer. The day after he offered the reward he was himself arrested for the crime. At the trial which followed several witnesses testified that the married life of Mr. and Mrs. McCue had been marred by jealousy on the part of the wife, and that they were continually quarreling. One sad feature of the trial was the fact that McCue had for years been a lawyer at the bar before which he was tried and convicted, and had been on friendly terms with most of those identified with the trial.

PAYS DEATH PENALTY GIVES UP HIS DUTIES

Montreal, Que., Jan. 20.—Antonio Graconi, an Italian, was hanged in the district of St. Francis today for the murder of Theodore Duval last August.

The murder of Duval was the result of a barroom quarrel. On August 20 the two men and a number of others who had been drinking heavily were in a barroom on Notre Dame street when a quarrel arose and Graconi, who claimed he was threatened by Duval, pulled a revolver and shot Duval, who died soon afterwards.

PALLIUM FOR BISHOP MOELLER

Gathering of Notable Roman Catholics at Cincinnati

Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 20.—There will be a notable gathering of Roman Catholic prelates in Cincinnati next month, when the pallium is conferred in insignia of office of an archbishop, Moeller. The pallium is the special insignia of office of an archbishop, and as such must always be worn by him when officiating pontifically in his own archdiocese or in the suffragan dioceses comprising the province of which he is the ecclesiastical head. Until the pallium is conferred upon an archbishop he is not allowed to perform certain duties of his office in his own archdiocese of province. The investiture of an archbishop with it is the last official act of his appointment.

The pallium will be conferred upon Archbishop Moeller during a pontifical high mass at St. Peter's cathedral. Cardinal Gibbons will preach this sermon at the investiture, which is one of the most magnificent ceremonies in the Catholic ritual. More than a score of other prelates, including several of the American archbishops, will also take part in the ceremony.

After the communion the prelate instructed with the investiture will lay the pallium in the center of the altar. The archbishop, clothed in all the pontifical vestments except the mitre and gloves, will kneel before the altar. Then in the name of the sovereign pontiff, the investor will place the pallium upon the shoulders of the archbishop.

The pallium itself consists of a small strip of lamb's wool to be worn over the shoulders and around the neck. Every year on the feast of St. Agnes, while the choir is singing the antiphon in St. Agnes church in the Via Nomentana outside of Rome, two white lambs are offered at the sanctuary rails by the Community of Lateran Canons Regular. They are then given into the care of some religious person until the time comes for shearing them when their wool is mixed with other lambs wool and woven into pallia by the nuns of the Convent of Toore de Spechi.

Early on the vigil of St. Peter and Paul the new pallia are laid on the altar in the confession of St. Peter, the crypt, in which reposes the body of the apostle. They are then blessed by the Pope, after the vespers sung on the vigil. They are then placed in a silver-gilt coffer in the closet proximity to the tomb of the apostles that the words in the form of conferring the pallium may be verified as literally as possible. These words are: "We confer upon the pallium taken from the body of the blessed Peter, the first apostle."
