## COAST EDITORS COMING

Portland, Jan. 20.—A reunion of all the state press associations on the Pacific Coast is planned to be held at Portland during the Lewis and Clark centennial in connection with the excursion of the National Editorial Association, which will visit Portland after concluding its sessions at Guthrie, O. T.

The original plan of the National association was to meet at Guthrie on May 20, and proceed from there to Portland, but as this would bring the editors to the Fair City about the opening date, June 1, it is likely that the convention will be postponed, and the National association visit the fair the National Association visit the fair

25. The National Editorial association, which is the largest and most representative body of newspaper men in the United States, met in convention in Portland five years ago, and its members brought home with them only pleasant recollections of their stay in the "Rose City."

The California, Idaho, Montana and Washington Press associations are agreeable to the idea of meeting in Portland about the time of the arrival of the National Association. The Oregon Press association has already voted to hold its 1905 session in Portland, and it is likely that the press associations of Nebraska and other states will swing into line as soon as definite arrangements for the Guthrie convention and excursion are completed.
