## PRISON LABOR ON ROADS

### Report of Supt. James as to Employment of Convicts

Under an act passed at the last session of the legislative assembly amendatory of an act passed at a previous session, the superintendent of the penitentiary was authorized to employ convicts upon and for the improvement of certain public roads within Marion county.

An appropriation aggregating \$3,249.83, including a balance of \$749.83 left over from a former appropriation was made for this purpose.

The work authorized by this act was commenced during the month of March, 1904. State teams were used when not otherwise employed, but were not sufficient to perform all the labor necessary to be done with teams. Other teams were hired with which to aid in the prosecution of the work. All the convicts who could be conveniently employed under one supervisor were furnished and used in this work. Only trustees were used, and for this reason no guards were hired, thereby economizing as much as practicable in the cash outlay necessary. The men were selected with care, worked well and faithfully, giving no trouble whatever. Something more than four miles of road extending from the reform school toward Salem, and connecting with grade previously built, has been constructed, and a good roadbed with ample drainage ditches on each side has been made, but as much of this grade was built during the extremely dry weather of the past summer, it could not be made as solid and compact as it might have been had there been more rain to keep the material in better condition for use in the construction of the grade. A good road plow, scrapers, shovels and some other implements for prosecuting this work were supplied by Marion county, and grade stakes were set by the county surveyor for guidance in running uniform drainage ditches and roadbed. Some work was done in repairing the grade between the deaf mute school and the asylum farm. The superintendent of the reform school, Mr. Looney, and citizens living tributary to this road, assisted in the work by furnishing a few teams, which were of material aid in hauling rock for use upon portions of the road, and which had, in some instances, to be transported quite a distance.

A balance of \$700.01 remains unexpended at this time of the appropriation made for the benefit of this road. Some portion of this balance may be used before the close of the year for improvement of places in the roadbed which may require some betterment and evening up after the rains have come to settle it.
