

HOW FISH ARE HATCHED

One of the Most Interesting Exhibits of All

Portland, Jan. 24.—The Oregon state fisheries exhibit which will be located in the north end of the Forestry building at the Lewis and Clark exposition, will be one of fascinating interest to Eastern people visiting the fair. The exhibit will show the methods used in hatching salmon, the chief fishing resource of Oregon, and there will be many specimens of the "lordly chinook," the king of fresh water fishes. Some of the largest fish of the spring catch, weighing 85 or 90 pounds, and measuring five and one half to six feet long, will be preserved in formaldehyde in inverted glass jars made especially for the purpose. The exhibit will be the finest of its kind ever displayed at an exposition.

In the large hatching troughs, which will be supplied constantly with eggs from the fish hatcheries, the visitors may see the various stages through which the eggs pass before the fish are hatched, as well as the newly spawned specimens. An abundant supply of clear mountain water will make it possible for the hatching process to go on as well as at the regular hatcheries.

The salmon is adapted equally well for life in fresh or salt water. The fish spends his youth in the fresh water and when a year old, being then a youngster four to six inches long, migrates to the sea. Four years later the salmon returns to its native river, spawns and dies. The salmon return to the river in great schools, in the spring, and in the latter part of summer. It is then that the fishermen, most of whom still use the picturesque boats adapted equally for sailing or rowing, get out their nets and draw in the fish literally by the thousands. At this time the salmon will weigh 35 to 40 pounds, and measure about three feet in length, though much larger fish are not uncommon. The fish generally brings 5 cents a pound at the cannery, and a good fisherman makes as much as \$100 a night.

As the salmon almost always die shortly after their return to fresh water, it is really an economy to capture them. A short closed season is provided by law and the fish that pass into the upper river during this season are caught and their spawn is taken from them for artificial hatching. Of the eggs which are laid naturally it is estimated that 80 per cent. are eaten by other fish.

The whole life story of the salmon will be illustrated at the Lewis and Clark centennial, and photographs will explain the methods used in capturing the fish and preparing it for market by canning, freezing or pickling. An idea of the importance of the salmon industry may be obtained from the statement that there were over twenty million pounds put up during 1904, and that the cold storage pack amounted to nearly five thousand tons.

Atchison Bond Issue

Topeka, Kas., Jan. 24.—The principal business before the meeting here today of the stockholders of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe is to set on the directors' proposition for a bond issue of \$50,000,000. According to announcement about half of the entire issue is to be expended in the next two years on extensions and betterments and other construction work. Of the remainder, about \$2,000,000 is to be used in buying equipment and double tracking the road between Chicago and Kansas City.

Railroad Rates and Insurance

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Jan. 24.—With delegates present representing many lines of industry and millions of invested capital the Iowa Manufacturers' association began its second annual convention in Cedar Rapids today. Nearly every manufacturing center of Iowa is represented at the gathering, which will be in session three days. It is expected that the association will give strong inducements to the measure now before congress to increase

the powers of the interstate commerce commission. Another subject that will receive attention is a plan for the formation of a mutual insurance company so that the manufacturers may escape the alleged extortionate rates now charged by the insurance companies doing business in Iowa.

Hardwood Lumbermen

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 24.—The Hardwood Manufacturers' association of the United States, which was organized at St. Louis two years ago, began its annual convention in Nashville today. Prominent lumbermen are in attendance from almost every state from Texas and Louisiana in the South to Illinois and Ohio in the North. The business sessions will continue several days and will be interspersed with various features of entertainment provided by the local members. One of the principal subjects to be discussed by the convention is that of forestry, and several noted forestry experts have been secured for addresses.

Providence Bench Show

Providence, R. I., Jan. 24.—The seventh annual exhibition of the Rhode Island Kennel club opened today in Infantry hall under auspicious circumstances. The show, from present indications, will be the most successful ever held in this section. The total number of thoroughbred canines on exhibition approaches one thousand, and every breed known to fanciers is included in the list. The entries come from many sections of the United States and Canada, and universal interest has been aroused in them. The distinguishing feature of the show is the large entry of sporting dogs.

Danville, Ill., Jan. 24.—Delegates from Chicago, Peoria, Springfield and numerous other cities were present today at the opening of the annual convention of the Master Plumbers Association of Illinois. President E. J. Ryan, of this city, called the gathering to order and in his annual address dealt at length with numerous questions of paramount interest to the craft. The convention will be in session two days and it is expected that considerable business of importance will be transacted.

Texas Hardware Dealers

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 24.—The annual convention begun here today by the Retail Hardware and Agricultural Implement Dealers' Association of Texas is the largest in point of attendance in the history of the association. Prominent dealers are on hand from almost every city of the state. The work of the convention, which will be in session three days, will be confined largely to the discussion of legislative measures affecting the trade of the hardware and implement dealers.

RECLAIM ARID LANDS

Bismarck, N. D., Jan. 24.—With delegates present from all parts of North Dakota and other interested visitors from Minnesota, Montana and other states, the North Dakota Irrigation congress opened here today. The sessions will continue until Thursday, and during that time much important action is expected to be taken looking toward the reclamation of vast areas of the Northwest that but await the touch of water to blossom and bear fruit. Not since the beginning of the movement in this state has so much interest been taken in the meetings of the congress and during the two days' session irrigation and its kindred subjects, forestry and colonization, will not only be discussed, but practical illustrations of what irrigation is doing for the West will be given. Among the speakers will be representatives of the National Irrigation association, the United States geological survey, the state agricultural and horticultural societies and several agricultural colleges and state experiment stations.

To Promote Good Roads

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 24.—The state good roads convention for which preparations have been making for some time opened here today with a large and representative attendance. A two-days' program has been arranged, the principal speakers including Senator Ashbury C. Latimer, of South Carolina; William E. McClintock, state highway commissioner of Massachusetts; and James H. Mac Donnell, state highway commissioner of Connecticut.

BRITAIN ACCUSES RUSSIA

Both Sides of the North Sea Episode Presented Before Regular Commission

The international commission appointed to inquire into the North Sea incident has begun its sessions in the state dining room of the d'Orsay Palace (Foreign Office), which is constantly crowded with high officials, diplomats and representatives of the navies of the principal maritime powers, including several staff officers of the Japanese army. Several members of the staff of the Japanese legation were among the diplomats present. A large force of British counsel and advisers was at the right of the court. Baron Taube, the Russian judicial advisers and other Russians are in attendance.

Hugh O'Beirne, of the British embassy, agent of Great Britain before the international commission, read the charges, which consisted of 17 specifications, minutely setting forth the attack on the Hull fishing fleet. It was specifically charged that no Japanese torpedo-boats and no warships whatever were among the fishing fleet, and that no Japanese warships were anywhere in the North Sea.

Baron Taube read the Russian reply, which specifically declared that two strange boats approached the Russian squadron, which boats the searchlights disclosed to be torpedo boats, moving off and later disappearing. The Russian statement asserted that Admiral Rojestvensky was absolutely obliged to act as he did, in order to destroy the torpedo boats, which had attacked his squadron.

Case for Great Britain

The principal charges of the British statement follow:

On the night in question there were not any warships whatever in the neighborhood of the fishing fleet, except those of the Russian navy.

No warships had been seen by the fishing fleet since a long time previous. None of the boats making up the fishing fleet carried any kind of material of war.

No Japanese warship of any kind whatever was at that moment in the North Sea.

There were not any Japanese upon the fishing boats.

The Russian fire continued after their searchlights clearly showed the vessels were peaceful fishing boats.

None of the Russian ships gave or even offered assistance.

The fire killed two men, wounded six, sank one boat, and damaged five others.

The statement concludes that the attack was without any provocation upon peaceful fishing boats pursuing their usual and rightful vocation.

Russian Version of Affair

Following are the principal points of the Russian reply:

At about midnight the flagship Kniaz Souvaroff saw the outlines of two small boats which approached with all lights extinguished directly toward the battleship.

When the two suspicious boats came within range of the Russian searchlights they were recognized as torpedo boats. Thereupon the battleship opened fire.

Thereafter a number of small fishing boats, not showing the required lights, were observed. Precautionary measures were adopted. Nevertheless there was a strong feeling of danger upon the battleship, and the imperative duty of protecting themselves against the attack of torpedo boats obliged a continuation of the fire, despite the evident risks of hitting not only the fishing boats, but also the ships of the squadron itself, which had arrived within the zone of fire.

In the meantime the two torpedo boats drew off and shortly after disappeared. Fearing that some of the fishing boats were damaged, yet being certain that the danger from the two torpedo boats, or possibly others, was not completely removed, Admiral Rojestvensky considered it indispensable for the entire squadron to continue its route without stopping.

Admiral Rojestvensky, while taking into account the damage caused to his fleet by the firing, nevertheless was compelled to use all the means in his power to destroy the torpedo boats which attacked his squadron.
