STATE NEWS

William T. Osburn, of Eugene (died at his home in that city Saturday, after a lingering illness. Deceased was well known in Western Oregon, where he has resided for many years. He was one of the members of the first city councils at Eugene. He leaves three sons, W. F. Osburn, proprietor of the Hoffman house; Dr. C. D. Osburn, of Wilsonville, and Robert Osburn, who is a druggist at Brownsville. The funeral was held yesterday.

Mrs. Jane Seales, of Pendleton, a pioneer woman of Oregon, died at her home in that city yesterday. She crossed the plains in '59.

Amos Damon, a highly respected pioneer of Lane county, is dead. He was born in Will county, Illinois, February 11, 1837. He crossed the plains by ox team in '52 and settled at Junction City. At the age of 17 years he helped to organize the first Methodist church in Lane county. He was married to Miss Rachel Ann Crow in '58, who survives him. He also leaves 11 children. The funeral was conducted Monday and the burial was in the plot near his home where he lived for so many years. He was one of the best known and well to do citizens in Lane county.

New Mining Industry.

George W. Tinsley, who conducts a country store at Cox's Bar, Trinity county, California, about 28 miles from Weaverville, says that during the season just closed he bought over \$4000 in gold dust from miners who obtained it from the moss in the river.

Moss mining, according to Tinsley, is becoming one of Trinity county's leading industries. He says that on the rocks and bedrock along both sides of the channel, especially in the riffles and in places where the current is swift, moss forms in summer months. When the water rises in winter it overflows these places, and the moss acts as a gold saver. When the water begins to fall in the summer the miners gather the moss, and either put it in the sun to dry, burning it later and panning out the ashes, or they wash it in tubs of water until the gold is extracted. The latter is said to be the quicker and better method.

It has long been known by miners that a great deal of fine gold was lost in mining, which went into the river. As the high water carries the tailings down the river, it would necessarily take the fine gold also, but how to save it was a problem which puzzled the miners until it was discovered that nature had provided the key.
