PROTECT OREGON GAME

Salem Rod and Gun Club Form Resolutions

At a meeting of the Salem Rod and Gun Club Association, held Monday evening at Salem, Oregon, the question of legislation to protect game in this state was thoroughly discussed by the large crowd of hunters who were present at that time for that purpose. The result was a series of resolutions adopted as follows, without a dissenting vote:

Resolved, That the Salem Rod and Gun Club is opposed to running deer with dogs; that it is in favor of limiting the killing of ducks to 20 by any one person in one day, or 50 to any one person in one week; that, in addition to the fine for exceeding the limit, there be imposed an extra fine of \$5 for the first bird killed above the limit, \$10 for the second, \$20 for the third, \$40 for the fourth and \$100 for the fifth.

That the limit of upland birds be five a day, with a graduated fine as in the case of ducks, and that any person found with more than the limit in his possession at any one time be conclusively presumed to have exceeded the limit; that no game whatever be sold, and that railroad, express and transportation companies generally be forbidden under penalty of a heavy fine to transport or have in possession birds of any kind; that railroad and express companies and other transportation lines be forbidden to carry game of any kind outside of the state of Oregon, and that there be a heavy fine imposed on any person who shall take game killed within the state of Oregon outside of the state.

Limiting the deer to five to any one hunter during the season. That a license of \$1 for all hunters be collected by each county and the license so collected form a fund for the protection of the game in that county; that each county appoint a game warden for that county, to hold office during good behavior or until his successor is appointed; that non-resident hunters pay a license of \$25 for hunting birds and \$25 for hunting deer.

That there be heavy penalties attached in addition to the regular fine for any person, restaurant, hotels or corporations to have game in cold storage; that one-half of all fines go to the informer.
