HOUSE EMPLOYS CLERKS

County Attorneys Bill Made Special Order

Chief Clerk Thompson called the house to order.
 House opened with prayer by Rev. Gordon, of Leslie M. E. church.
 On motion of Linthicum, of Multnomah, A. A. Bailey was elected temporary speaker of the house.
Petitions, Resolutions, Etc.
 By Mears—To investigate state university and other educational institutions, and report within 30 days after session.
 By Bramhall—That committee on enrolled bills have authority to employ sufficient clerks.
 By Capron—Relative to volunteers and officers of the Spanish war.
 All were referred to standing committee on resolutions.
 By Bramhall—For two clerks to assist in investigation of blind school, adopted.

County Attorney Bill.

Mayor's bill to create county prosecuting attorneys, to go into effect in 1908, came up on a committee report for indefinite postponement.
 Kay and Smith, of Josephine, spoke for the bill as a measure of economy. This was the only state that retained a district attorney system.
 Killingsworth said the bill did not go into effect soon enough, and the salaries were inadequate.
 Dobbins believed it was a step in the right direction.
 Mayor said it was a progressive measure, and he showed that it was a good business proposition. It should pass.

Kuney, of Sherman, said, as one of the committee, he wished it might go over to the next legislature, so that the salaries might be adjusted.

Edwards, of Lane, believed in putting the bill through now. This legislation should not be put off. It was the opinion of able men that this bill would improve the service in every county of the state.

McLeod asked why the committee did not amend the bill so that it would go into effect in 1906. The present deputy system was not satisfactory, and did not result in the proper prosecution of crime. If this bill passed it would save money and stimulate better performance of duties by present public prosecutors.

On motion, the house refused to kill the bill. Smith, of Josephine, moved reference to the judiciary committee. Carried.

The bill was made a special order Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

The Graham bill, appropriating \$1000 each for the widows of the murdered guards who lost their lives in the Tracy outbreak at the Oregon penitentiary is the same as the effort made by Mr. Davey at the last session, and its unanimous passage was a handsome act on the part of the house. Mr. Graham was heartily congratulated upon his success, and Mr. Davey comes in for a full share of credit in the matter.

The Graham amendment to the constitution, striking out section 2, article 17, relating to amendments, was favorably reported, and passed the house this afternoon.

Senate—Wednesday Morning.

The senate was opened with prayer by Rev. C. T. Hurd.

Senator Brownell was called to the chair, and the first hour was absorbed by hearing reports, etc.

It has been learned from prominent hop men of this city that B. O. Shuckling & Company yesterday sold 31 bales of their holdings at 27 1/2 cents. This comes as a surprise to the Salem market, this firm having been considered prominent among the bulls who have been loudly crying at 35-cent market in February. Great satisfaction is being expressed by the bears at this deal, they taking it as a vindication of their predictions of a drop in February. This sale clears most of the Shuckling holdings, but not quite. They still have several bales at their command. The hops sold and likewise those kept are said to be prime.

HOLDUP

BILL

KILLED

The senate unceremoniously killed the Croisan bill to make the crime of holdup a felony. The bill should be immediately introduced in the house. The bill should make the crime of holdup punishable by hanging in the county where the crime is committed. When the Lewis and Clark fair is held this state will become the rendezvous of holdup artists, and there should be some adequate punishment, and the governor has recommended that such criminals suffer the extreme penalty of the law.

Eugene Tows Wood.

The steamer Eugene arrived in the city this morning with a scow loaded with 100 cords of fir wood, consigned to the Union Light & Power Company, of Portland, commonly known as the Silverton Company. This wood is used in generating the power used by the Citizens' Light & Traction Company, of this city, they purchasing it from the Silverton people.

This load is the second which the Eugene has brought to this city this week, the first arriving last Sunday. The Eugene, which is commanded by Captain Albert Senn, belongs to the O. K. Spaulding Logging Co., of Newberg, which company also owns the steamer Gray Eagle. The Spaulding Company owns the wood which is being shipped in here, and also deals extensively in lumber, they having recently completed a new sawmill, near Newberg, with a capacity of 7500 feet per day.

The Eugene will take the scow which was brought up Sunday, and is now empty, back to the shipping point, about two miles above Newberg, tonight, leaving the other scow here to be unloaded and taken back Saturday, when the next load is brought up. There are 500 cords to be shipped to this city.

The Eugene is used by the company exclusively as a tow boat, and has been employed for the last six months in towing wood from different points along the river to Oregon City.
