SALEM SOCIALISTS MEET

Pass Resolutions Setting Forth Their Belief

Salem, Ore., Jan. 20, 1905.
To the Editor of The Capital Journal: The following preamble and resolution was read and duly passed at the last special meeting of the Salem Socialist club, and on motion it was decided to ask you to give it publication in your highly esteemed paper.

We, Socialists and members of the Salem Socialist club, believe that to be engaged in the spreading of the principles and doctrines of Socialism is to be working in the interest of the greatest and noblest cause of this, or any other age.

We confidently believe that the overthrow of the present capitalist system and the inauguration of the great cooperative commonwealth means more of liberty, more of the necessities and luxuries of life, more of brotherhood and true happiness than any other movement since the dawn of creation.

We believe that the present capitalist wage system is only another form of slavery that has come down to us through the hands of the capitalist class and is wholly in their interest and against the best interest of the great mass of mankind.

We believe that in many respects chattel slavery is superior to wage slavery. Chattel slavery insured to the slave abundant food and clothes, good shelter and good care in case of sickness. No wage slave is sure of these comforts. To be sure, chattel slavery sold children from their mother's arms, but the mother had the assurance that her children would be well fed and have warm clothing. The children of the wage slave mother is also sold from their mother's arms to drudge in the cotton mills and cotton fields of the South, and the coal mines and other capitalistic concerns. Those babies have to drudge in these human life devourers from 10 to 12 hours per day and they do not get good food nor good keep. They are poorly sheltered and do not get good care when sick.

We confidently believe that Socialism will liberate all these little slaves and put them into the school and the playground and that it will not only banish the hellish system of child labor, but that it will also liberate every other wage slave and that "the man with the hoe" will stand erect and dare to cast his eyes heavenward, that the blood of true freedom that will then course through his veins will cause an unfurling that will eventually develop him into a being of intelligence far superior to that which he possesses today, chained as he is to servitude of the capitalistic class by the chain of the lash of want. Under present conditions the declaration of our constitution which says "Every man has inalienable right to life" is made a lie. It is necessary and right that man should have to work in order to live, and as work is absolutely necessary for life, man has not now, nor never will have an inalienable right to life until he has free access to the means of employment and is guaranteed work at any and all times without asking permission of the master of the privately owned machine.

We confidently believe that no person can live up to the Golden Rule under the present greed and gain system. We fully believe that it is an utter impossibility for any one to live up to the principles of Christianity under a system which compels 90 per cent. of the people to be slaves to the 10 per cent. Fully concurring in all of the above declarations and statements and also fully believing that only through the entire overthrow of the present capitalistic system and the inauguration of the great cooperative system, when all things which we in common need and use shall be made by the people for their own use and for the use of none other than those who produce them (except of course invalids and those who are physically incapacitated) when nothing will be made for profit, and when we shall have no need of markets for our "surplus products," for there will be no surplus. When war and bloodshed shall be banished from the earth—we say banished from the earth because Socialism is a world-wide movement—it is not circumscribed by geographical lines nor bounds. We believe that war will cease because the struggle for more territory, for more markets, will cease.

Believing in all the above, and also believing that the local Socialist club is an essential medium in the great work of converting a majority of the people of this country to this the greatest movement, therefore

Be it resolved, That we renew our real and pledge ourselves anew to do everything possible for the upbuilding and strengthening of the club, and the cause of Socialism.
