

EMPEROR WILLIAM'S BIRTHDAY

His Subjects Pay Honor to His 46th Birthday

Berlin, Jan. 27.—All Germany united today in paying honor to Emperor William on the occasion of his 46th birthday. Military reviews were held in all the chief cities of the empire, and in churches of all denominations there were special thanksgiving services this morning. In the capital the banks and exchanges, offices and shops were closed the streets decorated with flags and bunting and crowded with people.

During the course of the morning Emperor William and the imperial family attended service in the chapel of the castle. Later in the day the Emperor received congratulations presented by all the members of the diplomatic corps, including Ambassador Tower. Great plans have been made for the court reception this evening.

Emperor William has now been on the throne 17 years and the strenuous life is beginning to tell on him. During the last year or two his hair has become streaked with gray and his face shows the imprint of the "crow's feet." Those acquainted with the every day life of the Emperor are not surprised that he is beginning to show traces of age, due not so much to advancing years as to his abnormal activity of mind and body. In addition to the cares of state, which are sufficient in themselves to bring the average mortal to an early grave, there appears to be absolutely nothing, great or small, that does not engage the attention of his imperial highness. When not engaged with the great problems of state he finds time to design warships, paint pictures, write books, criticize plays and music and attend to the most minute details relating to the army, navy, the courts and the commercial and industrial affairs of the empire.

Withal, he finds time to pay the most devoted attention to his large and interesting family. As "pere de famille," the Emperor is something quite different from his public self. True, he remains the autocrat there, but while he is rather severe with his children and never allows disobedience to go unpunished, even in the case of the crown prince who has not attained his majority, he lets all of them have their full measure of fun, nevertheless.

Those best acquainted with the home life of the Emperor declare that he is as devoted to the Empress as when he led her to the altar. The imperial couple will celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary next year and it will be made the occasion for grand festivities throughout the empire. The Empress is beloved by everybody who knows her, and there is but one voice as to her excellent qualities as a mother and a wife. Even the most rabid Socialist has never been known to accord her aught but praise.

Celebration at Washington.
Washington, Jan. 27.—Flags were flung to the breeze today from the German embassy, on Highland Terrace, in celebration of the birthday of Emperor William, who was born January 27, 1859. This evening the German ambassador, Count Spec von Sternburg, will play the host at a typical German dinner. The guests will include various members of the diplomatic corps and numbers of the most prominent German residents of the capital.

Brookton, Mass., Jan. 27.—Belford Walcott, brother of the welterweight champion, and Larry Connolly, of Boston, are to furnish the main bout of ten rounds at tonight's boxing show of the Brookton Athletic club. Both men are hard hitters and a lively contest is expected to result.

COCHRAN'S GREAT SPEECH

On the Impeachment of Federal Judge Swain of Florida

Congressman Bourke Cochran lamented that the proceedings might not have followed non-partisan lines. "Strange as it may seem," he continued, "the first partisan argument comes from outside the bench itself."

This, he said, was the reason for extending the operation of the house scrutiny. There was, he said, a vast difference between an impeachment and an indictment, a fact which the house seemingly had forgotten. No law of evidence binds an impeachment proceeding, as is the case with an indictment. He took issue with the majority on the expense account charge. That was a matter too high or too low to warrant such emphasis. Cochran mentioned the charge of non-residence as a grave one and, referring to the letter of Judge Pardee, which had been read in the house earlier in the day, at the instance of the governor, said:

"I do not believe it conceivable that a judge would undertake to control the action of the independent body on a proceeding itself judicial. Now think of it, the monstrous spectacle of a judge, himself a member of a department which we are now scrutinizing, stepping into the house with an attempt to control our action. When I state that, I describe a spectacle which ought to make us pause; which indicates in a marked degree a decay of our constitutional system."

"Suppose, sir, that when the case of Senator Burton was pending before the supreme court of the United States, the senate had passed a resolution declaring that Senator Burton was a model of virtue and senatorial courtesy, and that his prosecution was an act of insensible hostility on the part of some government department. Would not a thrill of horror have run through the entire country. Yet how would such action by the senate differ from this action of this judge attempting to control ours, the grand inquest of the nation, in dealing with a member of that judiciary? I do not call attention to the character of the transaction itself."

"How can this judge Pardee ever again ask a man arraigned at the bar what word he has to say why sentence for an offense against the revenue laws should not be pronounced upon him? Could not a criminal quote this language of Judge Pardee, and say that the law imposing revenue dues was immoral and should not be enforced?"

"And we have another judge," continued Mr. Cochran, "with superior claim to enlightenment of conscience, quoted by the gentleman from Ohio, as a man before whom we should all bend, coming in here and, sir, I say it with little short of horror, that he came in here with perjured lips, and asks us to share his perjury and disloyalty."

"A Republican legislature should not impeach a Republican! What a tribute he pays to the gentlemen on the other side! Are we to be diverted from a conscientious discharge of our duty by a man who, clothed in the ermine of a judge, turns that robe into a costume of a baroque, and, dancing across this floor, invites us to perjure ourselves and violate the constitution?"

NEW STEVENS ENGINE

A press dispatch from Ogden, Utah, states that the railroad officials there are testing what is termed the "monkey motion" type of engine, designed by Edgar M. Luckett, formerly of Sacramento, but now holding a responsible position with the Southern Pacific at Ogden. The "monkey motion" engine is one in which the eccentrics used to open the valves in the steam chests are done away with, and a patent appliance employed instead which places all the workings on the outside of the engine. The appliance consists of two circles, one larger than the other, which revolve and perform the work previously done by the eccentrics beneath the engine. Because of their peculiar motion the term "monkey motion" has been applied to this type of engine.

Inquiry at the railroad offices elicited the information that the "monkey motion" is not of itself a new type of engine, but was the result of investigations of A. J. Stevens, formerly a master mechanic in the shops. The invention is called "monkey motion" as a slang term, the proper name for it being Stevens' valve gear. Several engines of this type were built from top to bottom in the railroad shops under Mr. Stevens, and are even now in use from Dunsmuir to Ashland.

H. B. Breckenfeld, assistant superintendent of the Sacramento division, stated that Edgar M. Luckett, now master mechanic of the Salt Lake division, was foreman of the machine shops at Ogden under Master Mechanic Stevens, and was known as a very bright mechanic. He has been in the employ of the Southern Pacific for more than 20 years. Mr. Breckenfeld stated that it may be that Mr. Luckett has improved on the design of Mr. Stevens, and is testing it.

The "monkey motion" type of engine is said by mechanics to present some advantages over the eccentric motion engines, and to have some disadvantages also.

The press dispatch says a successful test was made of the new engine, when a train of 1500 tons was hauled

from Ogden to Wadsworth, Nevada, by one of the new engines.

The dispatch adds: "It is estimated that the new engine will save from 25 to 40 per cent of the coal consumption, being able to run 54 miles with one ton of coal, as against 25 to 28 miles under the present system. The standard engines now in use can be changed to the 'monkey motion' with but very little cost."
