JAPANESE CAPTURE PRIZE

Tokio, Jan. 28.—The steamer M. S. Dollar, owned by the Dollar Steamship Company, of San Francisco, en route to Vladivostok, with a cargo of provisions, was captured yesterday by the Japanese in the Pacific, east of Hokkaido island.

San Francisco, Jan. 28.—Advises confirming the Tokyo cablegram announcing the capture of the steamer M. S. Dollar were received here. The steam schooner Dollar left San Francisco a month ago with a cargo of hay, oats and barley, valued at \$200,000. The vessel is valued at \$200,000. and is manned by a San Francisco crew.

BANK OFFICIAL ARRESTED

Revel, Jan. 28.—Strikers attacked the Meier Company's works today. The troops fired on them, killing and wounding several.

The Czar Petitioned.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—A telegram from Moscow states that the nobles have prepared a petition in which the Czar is asked to summon a national assembly at Zmislky Sankor. This assembly to be only convened in time of national danger. It is to be composed of the nobility, burgesses and peasants.

Cold Blooded Murder.

Bedford, Ind., Jan. 28.—At the preliminary trial of Frank Evans and Elmer Browning, charged with the murder of Sarah Schaffer, this morning, Julia Cook, divorced wife of Elmer Browning, testified that she had been offered \$200 to leave town and not testify. She refused the money. The witness identified the blood-stained clothing given her on the night of the murder by Browning, together with the stone, covered with blood. She said Browning had threatened to kill her if she didn't bury the clothing. Browning admitted to her that he and Evans had killed the school teacher.

S. B. 167—Wright. To amend sections 3829, 3838 and 2839 of the code, relating to the board of dental examiners. Read third time and passed.
