At 3:30 this afternoon the President leaves Annapolis for Philadelphia, where he will address the Union League Club tonight, leaving for Washington in the morning.

PROBING 'FRISCO POLICE

San Francisco, Jan. 30.—The grand jury, in a partial report, this morning declares it has in its possession evidence and information tending to establish the existence of a regularly organized system of gross police corruption in Chinatown, and that it has secured possession of bribe money that has actually passed, and the confessions of several police officials.

FIFTEEN DRUNKEN MEN

Paint the Town Red--Raise Havock With Things in General.

Truckee, Cal., Jan. 30.—Fifteen drunken workmen played havoc with the manager of the RFloriston hotel, at Floriston last night. For some time past there has been ill-feeling between the boarders and Manager Glenn, the former threatening bodily injury to the manager of the hotel. Last night at the supper table Glenn rebuked the men for loud talking. They left the table and went to the office where they demanded whiskey. Three men then grabbed Glenn, and shoved him out of a window, and helped themselves to liquor. They broke bottled goods and spilled the rest, and broke the bar to pieces. They threw the stove through a window, turned a billiard table over and smashed the chairs and counter, and broke every light, climaxing the work by breaking every glass in the front of the building. They then went to the top of a hill and rolled big boulders down against the building. Word was passed to destroy the goods in the store, but guards were placed, and the mob was repulsed and gotten under control. The manager is not seriously injured.

Corrupt California Legislature.

San Francisco, Jan. 30.—Four members of the senate are charged with blackmail and seeking bribes in an affidavit made before the senate today. They are Bunkers French, Ramon and Wright. The affidavit was sworn to by William Curbin, secretary and general manager of the Continental Building & Loan Association, of San Francisco, who was cited to appear before the senate and show cause why Curbin should not be punished for contempt for failure to answer the summons of the senate committee to investigate his association.

President's Message.

Washington, Jan. 30.—The President sent to congress today a special message asking that steps be taken to secure uniform divorce laws by co-operation between states. He advised the collection of statistics on the subject by the census.

Cashier Surrendered.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—Cashier Foster, of the defunct Pan-American bank, surrendered this afternoon. He was released on \$10,000 bond. The officers are en route to New York to serve extradition papers on President Hunt.

NORTH SEA INCIDENT

Paris, Jan. 30.—At the session of the international commission today two Swedish witnesses, Captain Johnson and Mate Stromberg, of the steamer Aldebaran, testified that a few hours preceding the firing on the British trawlers their boat was attacked by a strange warship, which fired many shots, but without serious damage. The warship then disappeared. Hugh O. Belidam, the British agent, said the strange vessel was the Russian transport Kametchka, which mistook the Swedish craft for a torpedo boat. Belidam declared that the Kametchka notified Rejstvensky that he had been attacked by a torpedo boat, which led to the North Sea incident.

DIED.

BLINSTON.—At the family home at Rosedale, of cancer, at 7 a. m., January 29, 1905, Mrs. Sarah Blinston, aged 46 years, 9 months and 7 days, after a lingering illness of one year. Mrs. Sarah Willard was born April 22, 1858, in St. Lawrence county, New York. She moved to Wisconsin with her parents in 1868, and was married to A. M. Blinston in that state January 12, 1876. She came to Oregon with her husband in July, 1889, and settled in Rosedale, where they have lived ever since. Besides her husband, deceased leaves ten children, four sons and six daughters, to mourn her loss. The funeral will be held at Oak Chapel, interment in City View cemetery. The time has not been set, one son being in The Dalles and his arrival being awaited.
