Governor to Appoint One to Assist J. W. Hamilton

The House Passes Bills Monday Afternoon

The new county has over 5000 population, has 18,000 school children, and over \$1,000,000 assessed valuation. It was 12 years ago that the county was proposed to be created. Hood River is to be the county seat, and it will have 576 square miles. It was in line with progressive ideas to create smaller counties, and Mr. Jayne presented the facts in such a pleasing manner that the house passed the bill.

Representatives Capron and Kinney also made practical, plain spoken speeches for the creation of small counties, showing that as a rule they were prosperous, well-managed and had low tax levies.

Tax Commission Bill.

The Capron bill provides for a commission to get up an assessment and taxation law and report to the next legislature. It carries an appropriation of \$7000.

Kay opposed on the ground of expense.

Linthicum said the bill provided for a thorough investigation of the subject of taxation. He cited the work of the special session as costing the people a great deal of money on account of a hastily prepared bill.

Cornett moved to lay on the table, but the house refused.

On final passage the ayes were 36, noes 19, so the bill passed.

Fire Proof Jails.

The Dobbins bill for fire proof jails passed. The father of the bill made a few plain statements for the bill. It was necessary at times to have jails, and inmates were entitled to protection against fire.

A Mining Bill.

The Smith (of Baker) bill to make more plain the law relating to boundaries and work on mining claims caused some discussion. Linthicum said it was not necessary in addition to present laws. Kay supported it and Burns spoke against it. Brigham of Lane asked fair treatment for the bill, and it was referred to revision of laws.

To Enforce Laws.

The Steiner bill creating a special fund of \$10,000 to enable the governor to have a resource with which to enforce laws. Since he spoke last Thursday conditions had grown worse. Horses and other stock had been killed at wholesale in various parts of the state, and he hoped there would not be a dissenting vote. There was not.

Another Circuit Judge.

The Brigham bill to create another circuit judge in the second district was ably presented by its author, and passed without a dissenting vote in the house. The district is very large, comprising six counties. The present judge, J. W. Hamilton, was one of the best in the state, but was one and a half years behind in his work. The governor appoints a judge until June, 1906.

The bill of Sitz to remit the sum of \$181.37 paid by the Malheur Water Users' association as license tax, and remitting similar tax in other cases, passed.

S. B. 3—Miller. To amend subdivision 3 of section 3360 of the code, relating to the apportionment by the county school superintendents. Failed to pass.

Opened with prayer by Rev. Crawford.

Third Reading of Senate Bills.

S. B. 128—Whealdon, relative to county officers' bonds, providing counties shall pay for surety bonds. Passed.

S. B. 67—Nottingham, to declare time when any tax shall be deemed paid. Passed.

S. B. 107—Rand, to license peddlers and authorize county courts to fix fees, same to be not less than \$300 for three months. Rereferred.

S. B. 171—Sichel, punishment for wife beating, providing for whipping post. Nottingham opposed the bill as being a tendency to return to the practices of the dark ages and develop brutality. Brownell called attention to the fact that this was simply an effort to place it within the discretion of judges to inflict such punishment in severe cases. Senator Sichel stated that in Portland last year there were 75 cases of wife beating before the police court. He said that the chief object of the bill was more to discourage wife-beating and thought that there would be a few cases where this penalty would be resorted to. Rereferred.

S. B. 178—Carter, Ashland charter. Passed.

S. B. 183—Coke, authorizing Coos county to appropriate \$3000 for a Lewis and Clark exhibit. Passed.

S. B. 180—Brownell, constitutional convention bill, was made a special order at 10 a. m. Wednesday.

2 p. m., to consider constitutional convention. It was indefinitely postponed. This defeats a joint convention to consider the bill. Each house will now consider the Brownell bill in its separate capacity.

Fencing Railroads.

The Richie bill to amend the law relating to fencing right of way of railroads was adversely reported, and, according to the rules of the house, indefinitely postponed. Mr. Richie asked as a matter of personal privilege that he be allowed to explain the bill. The law now required the Oregon & California railroad to fence its tracks in this state. He wanted the law extended to all other railroads, on application of the owners of abutting lands.

To Tax Non-Resident Sheep.

Substitute for Sitz bill to tax all foreign sheep coming through the state for pasture or range, 10 cents per head for a year, or five cents per head for each county where fed, to be collected by county stock inspector, with penalties for collection, and power to sell same. After a clear statement of the provisions by Mr. Sitz the bill passed.

To Amend Registrations.

Richie's bill, providing that resident voters who are registered, shall not be required to register every two years, unless they change their residence.

Smith, of Josephine, opposed the bill as it made no provision for striking off the rolls those who died, and the result would be padded rolls.

Kay and Bottlemire spoke for the bill, and its author asked that it be re-committed to revision of laws. Mr. Bottlemire showed that the present registration tended to keep people from voting. Kay said there was a big expense each year to get voters registered.

Cornett suggested that anyone who failed to vote should be dropped from the lists.

The bill was not sent to the committee, and on final passage was defeated.

Kay moved to reconsider, and it was done, and the bill was sent back to the committee on elections.

H. B. No. 146—By Cavender, to license sailor boarding houses, was taken from the table and referred to the committee on judiciary.

All senate bills on the desk were read and referred to committees.

Adjourned to 2 p. m.
