

SMITH KILLED THE BILL

To Recede Time for Filing Deeds From Five Days to One

A bill was considered Tuesday that affected the time for recording real estate and caused discussion. It proposed to repeal the five days' time that is now given to get the deed on record. The bill favored city people, but jeopardized the interests of those living farther away.

Mr. McLeod made an able argument against the bill.

Killingworth said it was important to get this law enacted, as it compelled all to put their deeds on record at once. He spoke as a real estate man, and said the proposed change would make transactions easier and more promptly to be closed.

Mr. Jayne said the present law giving five days to file his deed was an absolute necessity to the great mass of people in Oregon. The new law was to catch the one man in a thousand who meditated committing a fraud. Smith of Josephine started the fight on the bill that resulted in its interment.

Centennial Notes.

The government buildings at the Lewis and Clark exposition cover 12 acres. An extensive outdoor display will also be made.

Washington will spend \$75,000 on her state exhibit at the Lewis and Clark exposition. A handsome state building will be erected.

One log in the forestry building at the Lewis and Clark exposition is large enough to build a one-story cottage 40x40 feet in size.

A model military camp will be a feature of the Lewis and Clark exposition. Visiting military will give daily drills during the exposition period.

The beautiful scenery of the Pacific northwest will be an exhibit itself for the people of the east and middle west who visit the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland this summer.

Exhibits are arriving by the carload for the Lewis and Clark exposition. The displays are being stored in the finished buildings and installation will begin in the spring.

The cream of Missouri's display at the world's fair at St. Louis will be

transferred to Portland for the Lewis and Clark exposition. Missouri's exhibit at St. Louis cost \$1,000,000.

Thirty national conventions will meet at Portland during the Lewis and Clark exposition. Most of the sessions will be held in Festival hall on the fair grounds. The auditorium seats 3000 persons.

Dr. T. K. Hunt, who had charge of the Igorrotes at the Louisiana Purchase exposition, is now in the Philippines collecting an exhibit of the wild tribes of the islands to bring to the Lewis and Clark exposition.

BIG BELLS FOR FAIR

Portland, Feb. 1.—In one of the towers of the government building at the Lewis and Clark centennial, 200 feet above the earth, and 280 feet above the surface of Guild's lake, the natural "grand basin" of the exposition, will be placed one of the largest sets of chimes ever manufactured.

The chimes will play an important part at the exposition, being run several times daily. On the opening day, when President Roosevelt presses the button at Washington, the chimes will peal forth in a glorious harmony, playing "America," while the wheels in the palace of machinery are set in motion for the first time and thousands of flags are unfurled throughout the grounds.

The chimes will form a part of the United States government's fine exhibit at the centennial. Their location, at the top of a tower, situated on the government peninsula in the middle of Guild's lake, will make it possible for them to be heard for miles about, and when they are rung, in the morning and evening, the whole of Portland and its suburbs will know that the great fair has opened or closed for the day.

The chimes have been ordered from a Cincinnati firm, and will be tested in Cincinnati before being shipped to Portland, so that the first time they will be heard on the exposition grounds will be when they proclaim to the world that the great fair is opened to the public.

It was not until after several different schemes for its downfall had been tried unsuccessfully that the animal made its escape, but when it did reach dry land it is reported that nothing could be seen but a red streak disappearing into the underbrush.

Given Twenty Days.

Wallace, the squaw, who was arrested for vagrancy last December and served 10 days in the city jail, was rearrested last night in one of the State street Chinese dens, and was this morning sentenced to 20 days' imprisonment. The officers, who always keep one eye on these characters, soon located her in the den, where she was arrested. She claims that she is not a "hop head," or in better English an opium smoker.
