Saloon doors are open in South Medford again. The jury decision in court this week was favorable for the saloon men, it having been decided that the local option law was unconstitutional. The fact that Medford is deeply in debt and needs the license money is thought to have been partly responsible for the jury's decision.

Joe Templeton, of the U. of O., has been chosen to represent the university in the intercollegiate contest that is to be held in Newberg in March.

The county court of Sherman county has appropriated \$2000 for aid in the construction of the state portage railway.

Jacksonville is soon to have a new electric lighting system. A franchise has been granted and the poles are already set for lighting.

The mildest winter in many years in the Grand Ronde valley is encouraging to beet growers, and a much larger acreage is being planted than ever before.

The Pendleton and Union creamery plants have combined and are now under one management.

The new Mormon church at La Grande will require 400,000.

C. Miltoma, a Japanese, has purchased 100 acres of hop land from David Dave for \$6000, and will plant 20 acres of hops this spring.
