
Sympathy for Russians.





ACT TO PURIFY ELECTIONS

Smith of Josephine Makes Strong Plea Against Corruption

Smith of Josephine made the finest speech of the session Wednesday afternoon on his bill to make corrupt use of money a crime in campaigns. He had a large audience and carried the house with him when he said he might never sit again in a legislative assembly or hold any other office, but he would feel he had not taken part in public affairs in vain if he could pass this bill.

McLeod of Union added his earnest words of approval to all that Smith had said. He was glad to support a bill for the purification of the elections even though it came to this strongly Republican house at the hands of a Democrat.

Bailey of Multnomah supported the bill as a good Republican measure. Ayes 54, noes 3.
