ANOTHER DISTRICT FAIR

Progressive Speeches Made by M'Leod and Dobbin

The Pierce bill for a fourth district fair in Eastern Oregon was before the house this forenoon.

McLeod championed the fair for Malheur and Lake counties. He said the people there were progressive, and were entitled to recognition. They had sent too many superannuated fossils to the legislature from his section. They demanded no wet nurses to look after their enterprises. They paid a great deal more than they received back in appropriations. This district fair would cost about \$1500. He was heartily supported by Dobbins, of Wallowa.

Smith, of Baker, spoke for the fair. Cornett opposed the clause allowing \$250 worth of printing by the state printer. He moved recommitment. Lost. Newell supported the bill as a good thing. The bill passed with but few votes. Bramhall, Calvert, Jagger alone were in the negative.

The fight will be made on all such charters. As Jagger said it was impossible to read all such charters. There is no fight on the Salem city charter amendments, and the bill has gone to the printer. Salem has no more Sunday saloons.
