UNDER THE BAN

All of the Typewriters in Poltava, Russia Have Been Confiscated

St. Petersburg, Feb. 6.—The police of the town of Romni, in the province of Poltava, have confiscated the typewriters in the place, which has over 15,000 inhabitants. No reason is assigned for the action, but as it is taken under the law of "increased defence," equivalent to a minor state of siege, there is no doubt that typewriters are regarded as dangerous organs of sedition. Since the first introduction of typewriters in Russia the authorities have looked upon the machines with more or less suspicion. They can only be acquired in the smaller towns of the empire under special permit of the police, who are thus easily able to locate every instrument. Up to a year or two ago a permit was needed even in Moscow and St. Petersburg. All the "proclamations" which have been in circulation this year were lithographed from typewritten copy, the typewriter having enabled the discontented to circumvent the extremely stringent laws which regulate the possession of printer's type and the use of it.

Famous "Peds" in Six-Day Race.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 6.—The first day of the seventy-two hour twelve-hour a day pedestrian race attracted a large crowd of lovers of the sport and athletics to the Old City hall today. The list of contestants and the auspicious conditions attending the opening of the race combine to give promise of a highly successful contest. There are nearly a dozen fast men in the race, the number including Pat Cavanagh, who won the last race held here two years ago; Gilbert Barnes, the G. A. champion, who finished second to Cavanagh; Gus Guerrero, the Mexican, who created a record for the seventy-two hours by covering 417 miles at the Madison Square Garden race of 1892, and E. C. McClelland, holder of the world's record for twenty-five miles.

Past Bout Expected.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 6.—As both lads are fit as the proverbial fiddle, a fast, slashing battle is expected when Jimmy Walsh, of Boston, and Monte Attell, of San Francisco, climb over the ropes to fight here tomorrow night. Much interest is displayed in the battle of the little fellows and a good house will likely greet them. It will be a 20-round affair, and will be pulled off under the auspices of the Commercial Athletic club. Chiefly because of his greater experience and his record of a 20-round draw with Jim Bowker, the English champion batsmanweight, Walsh is a favorite in what betting is being done on the result.

Two Million Co-Operators.

London, Feb. 6.—Some interesting particulars as to the growth of the co-operative movement in England in the past 10 years have just been published by the board of trade. Official returns relating to 2027 societies are dealt with. They show that the growth of the distributive and productive societies of all classes has been continuous. The present total membership is 2,085,731, compared with 1,245,066 a decade ago, an increase of 67½ per cent. The total stock, loan and reserve capital amounts to \$185,516,355, and during 1924 they did a business amounting to \$496,050,745.

ACQUIT SALOON MEN

Local Option Case Thrown Out on Technicality

The case of the State of Oregon vs. John Hendrickson, indicted with violating the local option laws, was begun in the circuit court yesterday before a jury. The state proved that local option had been adopted in precinct No. 1, and that the defendant sold liquors in violation of law. When it came to prove the order of the court declaring the result of the election, it was found that the opinion of District Attorney Allen had been embodied in the order of the court, thereby invalidating the order. The court was instructed to bring in a verdict of not guilty.

District Attorney Allen immediately prepared another order, which was ordered entered by the county court, and the defendant will be arrested and the case set for the February term of court.

It is now claimed by the defense that the county court had no authority to enter a second order, as the local option law expressly provides when the order shall be entered, and no legal order was entered within the time limit, the subsequent order is illegal and void. It begins to look as though the expressed wishes of the people of Uniontown will be set aside.—Astorian.
