STATE SOCIAL NEWS

Silverton News.

One of the most brilliant social events of the season was the advertising social given at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Webb by the Epworth League of the Methodist church. The attendance was large, and a very enjoyable evening resulted from the efforts of the league. A program was rendered and light refreshments were served.

Thursday while the southbound train was switching at Silverton a box car jumped the track. The engine with two cars was coming down the switch from the flouring mills when the last car jumped the track. The car was loaded with wheat, and the wheels sank into the ground up to the hubs. Two engines were fastened to it, but they failed to bring it back to the track.

At the council meeting held this week it was decided to widen and grade McLaine street. This is a much used street, and much complaint has been made about the bad condition in which it is at the present time.

J. Wolford & Co. sued Michael Anderson, a farmer living a few miles below Silverton, for a bill of goods bought by his daughter. The case was tried in Justice Mount's court Friday morning. The papers served on Mr. Anderson stated that he had bought the bill of goods himself. As the bill of goods was bought by Mr. Anderson's daughter, his lawyer raised an objection, and the case was finally thrown out.

The Silverton school is justly proud of the reputation it gained in the recent eighth grade county examination. It passed the largest number of pupils of any school in the county, and also had the highest average of any school. All passed with averages of more than 90. The school expects to do just as good or better in the May examination, for which a large class is being prepared.

The Silverton public schools secured the Horace K. Turner traveling art exhibit which has been on exhibition at the G. A. R. hall since Wednesday. The money taken in will be used to buy pictures for the school house. The

exhibit is not doing as well financially as it might. The Quaker doctors who have been in town for the past two weeks seem to have picked up all the stray nickels and dimes. It is a slam on Silverton to have it said that the Quaker doctors took \$800 out of town, while an art exhibit such as cannot be seen every day can hardly make expenses.

EDWIN STONE FUNERAL

Obsequies Largest Ever Held in Albany

Many Prominent Railroad Men Attend Last Sad Rites

The funeral of Edwin Stone, at Albany yesterday, was the most largely attended one ever held in that city. The day was bright and clear, and people from the surrounding country came in to pay their respects to his memory. A procession formed at Masonic hall at 2 p. m., and marched to the graveyard, where the services were conducted by the Masonic order. The floral offerings were many. The crowd was undoubtedly the largest that ever attended a funeral in Albany. A special train conveyed people from Newport, and two special cars brought a delegation from Portland.

The railroad men of Portland sent a lovely vase inscribed, "In loving remembrance of Edwin Stone, from his railroad associates, Portland, Oregon, February, 1905." This was to show the affection the railroad men had for their dead friend. The vase is one that Mrs. Stone can keep, and, when looking at it, will be reminded of the esteem in which he was held.
