

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

Discusses Plans for New High School and Asks for Changes

The school board of district No. 24 met at the police court room Saturday evening. All members of the board, as well as Clerk Goodale and Superintendent Traver, were present.

Director Byrd called attention to the fact that the above bills bore the "O. K." of only employees of the district, and after the board had passed upon the bills, Director Lee moved that in future no bills be allowed except when authorized by the purchasing committee or the board. Superintendent Traver took exception to Mr. Lee's motions, as for some time the superintendent had been in the habit of ordering whatever supplies were needed. Chairman Fletcher remarked that he realized that for two years past such had been the habit, but felt that the motion was a good one and should prevail. It was unanimously adopted.

Warrants were then ordered drawn for salaries the past month.

The matter of disposing of the old Dugan building was left with the chairman of the board, with power to act.

The board next took up the subject of plans for the new high school, and Dr. Byrd was the first to give his opinion. He thought the arrangement of the basement and first floor were good, but considered the second floor out of proportion. He called attention to the fact that a building of 12 rooms with a capacity of 600 pupils hardly needed an assembly room with a capacity of 750 people. Director Byrd freely discussed the matter of the building, and feared that the structure could not be kept

within the estimates. He suggested that when the plans were finally approved that the board advertise for bids for a wooden, a plain brick and pressed brick structure. He discussed the motives of different persons for wanting different kinds of a building, and thought that most persons who were strong in their prejudices for one thing or another might be influenced by different motives. He said all architects seemed to agree on brick, and suggested that possibly their motive was to increase the price, and thus swell their commissions.

Mr. Lee suggested that it would be a great help to the board if the architect would submit several sets of plans, and thus give the members of the board an opportunity to compare notes, and arrive at conclusions as to what they want. Mr. Condit rather favored the large assembly hall, and Chairman Fletcher favored having further plans submitted.

The board will hold a meeting Wednesday evening at the office of the architect, who is now absent in Southern Oregon, when something more definite will probably be arrived at.

STATE NEWS

The removal bill to remove the state capital of Washington has passed the Washington legislature.

The Albany military basketball team defeated the Morning Star Grange team, from near Jefferson, on Wednesday, by a score of 40 to 5.

Last week Mr. and Mrs. John W. Hicks, of near Silverton, celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. They came to Oregon across the plains in 1853.

Wednesday, while Pearl C. Campbell, Roy Moore and Ed. Adkins, of Hillsboro, were out duck hunting on a lake their boat overturned, resulting in the death by drowning of young Campbell, who had been married but three months. Moore was badly cut on the hands with barb wire, and nearly dead from exhaustion, while Adkins escaped practically unhurt.

Mrs. Matthew Wallis, an early pioneer of Lane county, died a few days ago. She crossed the plains in 1853.

The members of the Eugene high school have organized a band. Lloyd Pickard is president and Lester Rhodes is manager.

After having the representative of the old company state his case, the stockholders voted unanimously to reject the proposition, the result of which was hailed with tremendous applause, signifying how firmly the mutual telephone idea has become planted here.
